TRIED TO BURN ITALIAN QUARTERS

Fleischutt's House, Occupied by Foreigners, Set on Fire Presumably by Rioters

A dastardly attempt at incendiarism, which might have been successfully carried out had it not been for the prompt action of the neighbors residing in the vicinity, occurred on East Packer avenue a few minutes after 3 o'clock this morning, when unknown miscreants entered the house owned by Rudolph Fleischutt, poured kerosene on a couple of mattresses which were in the bedrooms down stairs, set fire to the same and fled.

People residing in the neighborhood saw the light through the windows, and before the flames had gained much headway they were extinguished with a few pailfuls of water.

The attempt to burn the Fleischutt house is the result of the excitement which has prevailed in this valley for several days over the murder of C. E. Messenger at Athens. The house is situated a few rods from the avenue beyond River street. It is a large frame building and has for some time been occupied by a large number of Italians, both men and women. Since the appearance of the mob in this place on Thursday evening the majority of the Italian residents in Sayre became frightened, and many of them left town. When the incendiaries visited the Fleischutt house this morning the building was empty. Everything in the shape of furniture had been removed from the rooms upstairs, but the occupants of the downstairs part had left their household goods as they had used them. Finding that no one was at home it was an easy matter for the miscreants to enter the house undetected and proceed with their felonious work. The firebombs may or may not have been known that the house was unoccupied. In any event oil in large quantities was poured over the mattresses and the match applied. One of the mattresses was almost entirely consumed while the other was badly scorched. The flames reached the walls of the rooms but did not do any great amount of damage. While the police are satisfied beyond a doubt that the mattresses were set on fire they are unable to obtain any clue as to the identity of the party or parties who did the job. That they were a part of the mob which visited Sayre there can be no doubt.

On Thursday night the Fleischutt house suffered considerably at the hands of the mob. The windows were broken out, a hole was forced through the siding, and it was more or less damaged.

The fire companies responded to the alarm which was sent in but when they arrived their services were not needed.

RIOTERS DISCHARGED

Pearl Yontz and Rudolph Fleischutt, who were arrested on Thursday evening by Chief Walsh and later charged before Justice Carey with rioting, were arraigned last night and given a hearing. As there was no evidence that either of the men had taken any part in the unlawful assembly they were discharged. When arrested Fleischutt was defending his own house which was occupied by Italians, and which the mob was stoning.

"LEPER" CAR STILL IN SAYRE YARDS

Superintendent Kinney Says That Proper Disposition Will Be Made of It.

The Lehigh Valley "leper" car is still in the Sayre yards, notwithstanding the reports that it was burned. Yesterday Dr. Kline, president of the board of health, called upon Superintendent Kinney, and that official told him that he had assurance from the highest officials of the road that the car had been properly fumigated before it was delivered to the Lehigh Valley. Today a Record representative interviewed Mr. Kinney on the subject and was informed by him that proper disposition would be made of the car, and that the residents of Sayre need not become alarmed. He also said that if the car had not been properly fumigated it would not have been allowed to leave Parkersburg. When the rumor that the car had been painted and renumbered was called to his attention, Mr. Kinney would neither affirm nor deny.

DRUNK SINCE THE CIRCUS

Long Tom McAsee, who admitted having been drunk since the day the Barnum & Bailey circus showed in Sayre, fell into the clutches of the police last night. Tom was in a highly inebriated state when taken into custody. This morning he was given a hearing by Justice Nelson and sentence was suspended upon his promising to leave town.

ANTICIPATED TROUBLE WITH RIOTERS LAST NIGHT DID NOT OCCUR

Anticipating another outbreak on the part of the mob which had terrorized Athens for three days, and later attempted to invade Sayre, the local authorities got busy yesterday afternoon and when evening came preparations had been made to resist any and all unlawful violence. In the afternoon Chief Walsh and Burgess Cross held a consultation, with the result that six young men, who it was believed had participated in the demonstration made in Sayre on the night before were placed under arrest. They gave bail before Justice Carey for a hearing on Monday evening, September 10. Following the arrest of the young men Sheriff Griffin was called upon the phone and requested to come to Sayre. The sheriff responded promptly and arrived here in the early part of the evening. He immediately proceeded to swear in nearly a half hundred able bodied men as deputies and these were ordered to report at the council chamber and be ready for vigorous action should the mob decide to invade Sayre.

By eight o'clock in the evening there was quite a large crowd gathered at the corner of Packer avenue and Desmond street, but it is presumed that it was only for the purpose of witnessing the work of the mob. The sheriff and the chief of police and several other officers paroled Desmond street and kept the crowd moving. By nine o'clock the people on the street began going toward their homes, it being evident that if anything were done at all, it had been postponed until later in the night. At ten o'clock the streets were practically deserted and the sheriff told his deputies that they could go home. The sheriff boarded a train and went to Towanda and nothing further developed until about three o'clock this morning when the fire alarm blew.
