EMERY GIVEN A ROUSING RECEPTION

Candidate for Governor Addressed a Big Meeting at Athens Last Night

Athens—The visit of Hon. Lewis Emery, Jr., candidate for governor, Hon. W. T. Creasy, candidate for secretary of internal affairs, Hon. J. S. Black, candidate for lieutenant governor, and George E. Mapes, state secretary of the Lincoln party, was an occasion of unusual importance.

In the evening a public meeting was held at the Elsbree Opera House. N. F. Walker called the meeting to order and W. J. Young of Towanda was elected chairman and C. W. Leonard of Athens, secretary.

Hon. W. T. Creasy was the first speaker introduced. He spoke mainly on the tax question and of the difficulty in getting an equitable adjustment so that the burdens should not bear more heavily upon the people than upon other sources of revenue.

English Battleship Launched. LONDON, Sept. 5.—The British battleship Lord Nelson, sister ship of the Agamemnon and second in size and armament to the Dreadnought, was successfully launched at Jarrow-on-Tyne. The Lord Nelson is of 16,500 tons displacement and will carry a crew of 755 officers and men.

President to Leave Oct. 1. OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Sept. 5.—President Roosevelt will leave Sagamore Hill for Washington Oct. 1. Three days later he will make a flying trip to Harrisburg and York, Pa., where he will deliver speeches.

Delphin Stake Goes to Outsider at Sheephead Bay. NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Nealon, a 12 to 1 shot, won the Delphin stake, one mile and a furlong, at Sheephead Bay, defeating the favorite, Cottontown, by a head. The latter was badly ridden. Nealon led to the back stretch, where Cottontown took command, but Nealon came again in the stretch and won.

His Vessel Drifted Inshore. GALVESTON, Tex., Sept. 5.—The captain of the fishing smack Aloah cables that his vessel was seized by the Mexican transport Progreso while lying at anchor, becalmed, close to Aransas reef. Since the seizure of three smacks some time ago Americans have continued to fish in the same localities, but have carefully observed the three mile limit set by Secretary Root as free water for all fishermen.

Girl Assassin Not Identified Yet. ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 5.—The central committee of the Social Revolutionists has issued a proclamation stating that General Min, former commander of the Semenovskiy regiment, was killed by order of the northern fighting section of the party. To the police the girl who shot him acknowledged that she had done the deed, saying she had executed the sentence of the fighting organization of the Social Revolutionists. She refused to give her name, and her identity has not been fixed.

Laborer Lumber Mills Burned. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Sept. 5.—The lumber mills owned by the Dickie company at the headwaters of Hamilton inlet, Labrador, where the Quebec government recently seized 45,000 logs belonging to the company on the ground that they had been cut within that province, was destroyed by fire Aug. 11. The news was brought here by the Labrador mail boat, which arrived last night, bringing forty-two lumbermen who worked at the mills. The loss is estimated at \$20,000.
