JUST A CASE OF SOUR GRAPES

The Daily Times is Mad Clean Through and Has Succeeded Admirably in Letting the Fact Be Known

Tuesday's issue of the Daily Times (elsewhere referred to as the d. t.) contained the following article which for downright deceit, deliberate misrepresentation and unqualified falsehood surpasses some of the Machiavelian criticisms that have appeared in the d. t. during the last year. The article in full is as follows:

Last evening council meeting paraded another chapter in the sewer work which adds to the comedy sketch and the people's money is being spent freely without anything to show for it. The bills for printing the specifications was presented last evening being nearly double that which it was given out it had been for. Mr. West stated at the time that the lowest bid was for 75 cents a page and the type asked for was 10c, but it was completed of large type and the pages well padded, making nearly double the size asked for by other printers, and now the bill for \$73.77 has been ordered paid.

This with other bills makes the sewer proposition an expensive one to even think of, let alone even having it built. The publishing of four ordinances in one paper which bill has been rendered and ordered paid is almost double the price that has been charged for borough work heretofore and yet the comedy goes on, until the sum of \$1,500 has been foolishly spent and the sewer proposition right where it started.

Some one ought to ask the Sewer Committee to resign and stop spending the people's money so lavishly.

It will take at least a fortnight longer, to secure a rig to cross the flats, which the committee asked to have contracts for and another month will make it pretty late for this season's work.

The d. t. may be likened to Vesuvius. An outbreak is apt to take place almost any time, and when it does occur mud flows right and left. The trouble with the d. t. is that it suffers with a chronic grouch which in the wrong time of the moon vents itself in an outburst. In the case of the little job of printing the sewer specifications the d. t. lost the job, and the usual ill-natured howl followed. When the committee requested estimates for printing the specifications, the d. t. asked 80 cents a page, and The Record 67 cents. Naturally enough the difference of 13 cents a page gave the work to The Record, and the copy was put in type promptly, men working day and night to submit proofs as soon as possible.

After the work had progressed that far, the members of the council who had charge of the sewer proposition, for reasons which can be ascertained by any citizen—and for which The Record was no more at fault than the d. t.—decided to reject the specifications already in type and substitute other copy.

After the type had been set the second time the book was printed. The completed work was charged for at the rate of 67 cents a page, 13 cents a page less than the bid of the d. t., and as the work figured 65 pages the total charge was \$43.55. It was not the fault of The Record that the first specifications were discarded, and accordingly the cost of typesetting that was not used was charged to the borough, the amount being \$30.22. Regarding the workmanship on the sewer book, The Record is more than willing to have it compared with last year's edition of the Annual Report of the Robert Packer hospital.

In the second paragraph of the d. t.'s article the statement is made that the bill of one paper for publishing ordinances relating to the sewer proposition is almost double the price that has been charged for borough work heretofore. Now that the d. t. has broken the ice, let us look into some of its own charges for publishing ordinances. Along in April and May, 1905, the d. t. published an ordinance which was to grant a franchise to a trolley road. The ordinance appeared once a week for four weeks, and according to the records of the borough, was charged as 40 folios at 75 and 50 cents a folio, the total amount of the bill being \$90.00—and the bill was paid. In printer's parlance, a "folio" is usually taken as meaning 100 words, and that number of words should make about 12 lines when set up in type of the size ordinarily used for advertising legal matters. Accord-

ingly the rate per line charged by the d. t. for advertising this trolley ordinance the first insertion would figure 6 1/4 cents, and for each subsequent insertion the rate per line would be 4 1/6 cents. The rate per line charged by the other paper for advertising the four ordinances relating to the sewer proposition is exactly 2 cents, yet the d. t. brazenly states that the price was double that charged the borough heretofore. If the d. t. had charged 2 cents per line for advertising the trolley ordinance the bill would have been about \$38.40, instead of \$90.00 which was paid the d. t. for the service.

Again, in the third paragraph of the d. t. article quoted above, the statement is made that the sum of \$1500 had been foolishly spent and the sewer proposition right where it started. This is a bald misstatement, made with the obvious intent of discrediting the work of the sewer committee. Up to yesterday noon the records of the borough show that \$1188 21 had been paid out on the sewer proposition, and The Record believes that every dollar of the amount has been wisely expended.

The figures that are given above are taken from the records of the borough and their correctness can be verified by any citizen.

The suggestion of the d. t. that the sewer committee resign is not made in good faith. The d. t. is trying to throw dust in the eyes of the people by creating the impression that the resignation of the sewer committee is for the best interests of the borough, but the Africans in the d. t.'s woodpile will not keep hidden. The plain fact of the matter is that the d. t. is sore over a little job of printing which its high prices did not secure, and the frantic yell which emanates from the Lockhart street blunder factory can only be charged up to the inordinate jealousy which has characterized the policy of the d. t. ever since the first issue of The Record. It is just an ordinary case of sour grapes surcharged with venom.

HEALTH BOARD HAS POWER TO ACT

State Health Commissioner Says No Certificate Has Been Issued by Him Concerning Leper Car

The Lehigh Valley leper car still occupies the center of the stage. At the meeting of the council on Monday evening it was brought up and discussed, and at that time Attorney Yocum stated that as secretary of the board of health he had written the state board for information concerning the report that the car had been fumigated, renovated and disinfected. This morning Mr. Yocum received a letter from Dr. Dixon, state health commissioner. The letter follows:

Harrisburg, Sept. 4, 1906. Mr. C. C. Yocum, Sayre, Pa.

Dear Sir:—I have your letter of the 1st instant, and beg to say that no certificate has ever issued by the department of Health of Pennsylvania certifying that the car used for the Assyrian leper has been properly fumigated and there was no danger of spreading the disease by the use of the car. The car is now in the jurisdiction of your board of health. If your board feels that it is necessary for the protection of the health of your people to have the car burned I would say that their authority would not be interfered with by a certificate from a board of health of another state.

Yours very truly, (Signed) Samuel G. Dixon.

It will be seen from the above letter that the state health authorities have never had jurisdiction of the car, nor will a certificate from health boards of other states interfere with any action which the local board may see fit to take. Whether the local board intends taking any further steps is not known. This morning Councilman Hassler stated to a Record man over the telephone that the car is at East Waverly; that it has been painted brown, but that someone has marked it so liberally with chalk that from a distance it looks as if it had been painted white. Mr. Hassler also stated that the car had been as far as Manchester but that when it reached that place the train crews refused to handle it. Mr. Hassler did not explain, however, in what manner it was brought back to the yards at East Waverly.
