Unlawful Influence. PITTSBURG, Sept. 6. - Ex-Judge Chadwick, the dethroned "queen of finance," with the adverse influence of James W. Friend of Pittsburg in case Mrs. Chadwick applied for a pardon and release from the Ohlo penitentiary at Columbus, where she is incarcerated.

PEACE FOR CUBA.

Menocal Trying to Bring About Truce In Island Revelt.

HAVANA, Sept. 6.-The outlook for peace has grown brighter, as General Menocal, tire leader of the Veterans' association, who conferred with President Palma, has received from the president this notification: "You can do for peace all that is compatible with the honor of the government."

The veterans appointed Generals Menocal and Cebreco to see the leaders of the revolution who are now imprisoned in the Principe fortress, Havana. They will visit them in company with Sena-tor Zayas, president of the Liberal party, who is counsel for General Castillo, one of the prisoners. General Menocal went to the fortress and conferred with Jose Miguel Gomez, Demetrio Castilio, Gualberto Gomez, Carlo Mendieta, all prisoners. At the same time General Cebreco had a conference with Sepator Zayas.

The veterans will meet again at Gen eral Menocal's house to hear a report from him and Cebreco. Undoubtedly Menocal will succeed in his first demand to both sides, which is to proclaim a truce until the veterans.
