THE VILLAGE DOG LAW

Waverly—As the village officials have signified their intention to enforce the village dog law it might be well for all who are owners of canines to become acquainted with the ordinance. The present law provides that every dog shall have a tag, which costs 50 cents, that a description of the dog shall be filed with the village clerk, and that the dog shall not be allowed to run loose from June 15 to September 15 without a muzzle. In case of failure to comply with these requirements, the police officers of the town are directed to kill the dog whenever it is found at large, and the owner of the dog is also subject to a fine of \$5.00.
