MASSACRE GOES ON Horrible Slaughter and Destruction at Seidlice. ARTILLERY KILLS HELPLESS JEWS Four Hundred Perish From Fury of Russian Troops—Revolt in St. Petersburg Prison When Girl is Shot.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 11.—A special dispatch says that for the last thirty-six hours firing has been going on in different parts of Seidlice. Some of the houses in the great bazaar are now burning. More than half the population of 28,000 are Jews.

It is estimated that in the fighting and massacre 400 persons have perished. One thousand, most of them Jews, were killed by the soldiers. The massacre was carefully planned beforehand, the soldiers warning all of the Christian population in advance to hang out their ikons, so that they might remain undisturbed.

SATURDAY NIGHT some terrorists killed two soldiers, and thereupon the Liban regiment broke forth in unrestrained fury. They began murdering Jews on every hand and continued the work of slaughter all Saturday night and all day Sunday.

W. J. Bryan Makes a Statement at Lincoln, Neb. LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 11.—William J. Bryan gave out a statement announcing that as soon as he returned from his southern trip he would enter the campaign in Nebraska and several other states.

"The election in Nebraska is not only important because of its bearing on state matters, but it is also important because of its influence on the next national campaign. The vote this year will be taken as an indication of the trend of public sentiment."

PALMA WILL FIGHT

Cuban Government Declares All Peace Projects Off. GUERRA TO STRIKE A HEAVY BLOW

Sweeping Victory Over Rebels—Work of Armored Trains With Quick Fire Guns in Charge of Americans. HAVANA, Sept. 11.—General Pino Guerra is concentrating his forces with a view to strike a heavy blow.

It now appears that the rebels are in possession of the junction at Rincon of the United Railway branches, and trains on the Western line are stopped and searched at will.

was attended by President Palma, Vice President Mendez Capote and all the members of the ministry. It had been decided to declare all peace projects off.

It was agreed at this meeting that the government could not consider the propositions of the Liberals, the main features of which are that President Palma shall resign and that the vice president and members of the cabinet shall do likewise.

Laborde was charged recently with murder and was placed in jail near Havana. He offered the government that if he should be paroled he would organize a hundred men and fight for the government, agreeing to return for trial after the conclusion of hostilities.

Four more batteries of machine guns from Havana arrived safely in the region east of Consolacion del Sur and near the point where the rebels destroyed bridges and disabled the first armored rapid fire train sent out.

A sweeping victory over the rebels is officially proclaimed. The government announces that the armored military train was rescued from the insurgents by a light by Colonel Avalos between Herradura and Consolacion, the rebels having 300 killed and the loyalists only one killed and six wounded.

COBB IS RE-ELECTED

Maine Decides on Continuation of Prohibition. DAVIS, DEMOCRAT, GETS LARGE VOTE

Congressman Littlefield Wins Seat Notwithstanding That Gompers and Labor Vote Was Pitted Against Him. PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 11.—Governor William T. Cobb of Rockland, Republican, standing on a platform devoted almost exclusively to a continuation of the prohibitory law of the state, has been re-elected by a plurality of less than 8,000, but with few exceptions the smallest margin of votes ever given a Republican governor in the state of Maine.

More interesting from a standpoint of view was the re-election of Congressman Charles E. Littlefield, Republican, of the Second district by a greatly reduced plurality. Congressman Littlefield's candidacy was the subject of bitter opposition on the part of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who asked for his defeat on the grounds that he had voted against certain organized labor measures at the last session of congress.
