URA DRAKE IS AGAIN IN TROUBLE

Fifteen-Year-Old Lad This Time Charged With Stealing Valuable Property

Athens—Thursday night, Sept. 6, Mrs. George A. Dayton had property consisting of two single harnesses, one horse blanket, two bridles, two lap robes, one pair stirrups, one saddle, one riding bridle, and lines belonging to a double harness, valued at \$50.60, stolen from her barn in Litchfield. Chief Mulligan and Constable McGovern were summoned to trace the thief and find the property. They had suspicions that Ura Drake, a 15-year-old lad, son of Fred Drake, who lives on the Steve Evans place, was the guilty party. Chief Mulligan went to search the house and McGovern went to the woods just back of the Drake residence. Constable McGovern found the property in secluded place in the woods covered by a tent that was erected by tying the tops of some saplings together at the top and spreading a tent cloth over them to hide them. A warrant was issued for the arrest of young Drake, but he could not be found. Last evening Mr. McGovern went to the Drake residence, arriving there at about 6 o'clock and the lad saw him coming and fled to the woods. He hid himself where he could watch the house and at about 10 o'clock the lad returned and went into the house. McGovern went to the back door and soon the boy's father came out and went to sawing wood. McGovern then rushed in at the open door and captured his prisoner and brought him to Athens, where he rested in the lockup the rest of the night. His hearing will be held before Justice Tozer, when Mr. Dayton arrives from Towanda. This is the same lad that was arrested for stealing Steve Evans' bicycle in Sayre, and selling it, which case was settled a short time ago.

ITALIAN SHANTY BURNED AT ATHENS

Fire Was Doubtless of Inconspicuous Origin and Building Was Entirely Consumed
Athens—Last night at a little after 12 o'clock the railroad shanty at the north side of the crossing on Elmira street was discovered to be on fire and the alarm was sounded. The firemen responded, but the building was an old shell and before the fire could be checked the most of it was consumed. This building was a rough structure and has been used by the railroad track walkers for a number of years, but more recently it was inhabited by an Italian colony who were driven out of town in the recent past. No one has resided there since the Italians left town and the fire was of inconspicuous origin. It is difficult to determine who was the perpetrator of the deed and what the motives could be in burning the building. There has been a persistent rumor on the streets that the Italians were coming back to Athens and that they were to have government protection. This rumor may have incensed certain residents of the town so that they have taken this means to circumvent their coming. The building was of small value and not insured, and the only damage resulting is the loss of about a million flies of bedbugs that inhabited it.
