ATHENS CHURCHES

The missions conducted by the Jesuit Fathers at St. Joseph's church will conclude tomorrow. REGIMENTAL REUNION

Athens---The annual reunion of the survivors of the Fifty-seventh Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers was held in Sheshequin today, and there was a good attendance. This regiment was organized in September, 1861, and the men who enlisted from Athens and vicinity were assigned to Company H, commanded by Captain D. W. Gore. George W. Perkins rose from the ranks to lieutenant and adjutant and finally to lieutenant-colonel, and commanded the regiment at its muster out June 29, 1865. Horace Willis-ton, of Athens, was quartermaster of the regiment on its organization but resigned in August, 1862. Major Jeremiah Culp was killed at Fair Oaks, May 31, 1862, and his body was sent to Towanda for burial. Joseph Brady of Sheshequin, was killed at Chancellorsville, May 3, 1863. The regiment was brigaded with the 141st from this county, and they had a brilliant record of service.

A BRILLIANT RECORD.

Lieutenant General Corbin Retires From the Army He Adorned. WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.---Lieutenant General Henry C. Corbin was retired at noon today, having reached the age of sixty-four years. General Corbin has had a long military career, having entered the volunteer service in the civil war in 1862 as a second lieutenant in an Ohio regiment and was mustered out as colonel of a colored regiment in 1865. He entered the regular service as a second lieutenant when the army was reorganized in 1866 and remained in the infantry until 1880, when he was appointed to the adjutant general's department.

He became adjutant general in 1898 just before the Spanish war, and it was during that war he made a reputation which resulted in his being made a major general while still being adjutant general. The office of adjutant general under the conditions obtaining at that time made General Corbin practically the head of the army, and as he was the intimate and trusted friend of President McKinley no man had more power in the management of the army than General Corbin.

MOTOR CAR KIDNAPERS.

London Banker Accused of Spiritism Off His Young Relative. PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 15.---Charged with kidnaping his eighteen-year-old sister-in-law in an automobile, Charles E. Carboneau, a wealthy London banker, was arrested at the Hotel Bellevue-Stratford. It is charged that Carboneau abducted the young woman, Miss Agnes Mulrooney, as a measure of revenge against her sister, his wife, from whom he is separated.

When Carboneau arrived at the hotel he registered under a fictitious name and made the girl do the same. They occupied separate apartments. Detectives Whitcomb and Lynch of the city hall staff, to whom was assigned the duty of tracing the kidnaped girl, captured Carboneau after a short struggle. Lloyd G. Bush of 58 North Fifth-ninth street, who is said to have operated the auto, was also arrested at his home. Miss Mulrooney went to the auto at the request of Carboneau, and before she could speak she was pulled into the car, it is charged. Then the automobile was rushed down Cleveland avenue, bearing away the unwilling girl.
