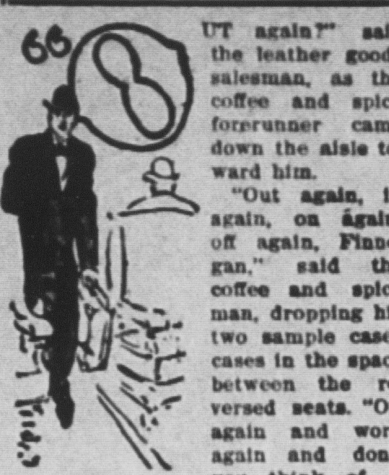

London Society in Trade

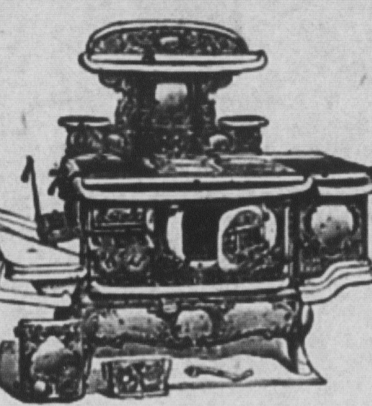
