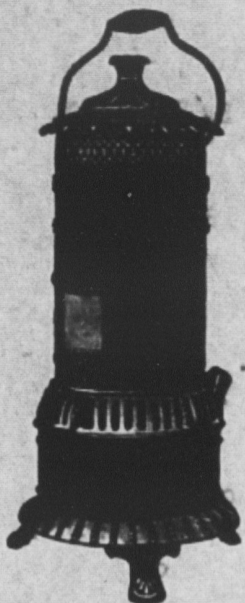

A SENEGAMBIAN IN THE WOOD PILE

Public to Judge Why the Record is Not Listed in Telephone Book

Items of news, big or little, are always cheerfully received by The Record and as cheerfully printed. If you have friends visiting at your home, or if you are going out of town yourself, communicate with The Record and we will see that your item is inserted in the columns of the paper. If you cannot come or send to The Record office, grab the telephone—the Valley—and communicate with us in that way. But before you telephone, a little explanation will be necessary. The Valley Record is not listed in the telephone book of subscribers. The abandoned ties of the Lehigh Valley are sold to foundaries at the rate of two cents each. The ties originally cost 65 cents each, and private citizens living along the line of the railroad would gladly purchase them at a higher rate than the company receives for them, but the officials will not sell.

It is believed by many that the action of the several eastern railroads in reducing the rate of fare to two and one half cents per mile will ultimately result in a two-cent fare. The railroads can afford the cut, and the opinion is held that they will adopt the two-cent rate voluntarily rather than be forced to late.

RAILING GAVE WAY ACKLEY TUMBLED

Fell Fifteen Feet, But Escaped Serious Injury

A section of the railing on the back porch of the Laws block on Desmond street gave way yesterday afternoon and precipitated Eugene Ackley to the ground below, a distance of nearly fifteen feet. Ackley struck on his head and shoulders, but aside from a bad bruise on the right side of his face and a contusion of the right shoulder he is little worse for his experience.

Ackley and his family have been living on the second floor of the Laws block for some time, but yesterday he was engaged in moving. The household goods were taken out the back way and lowered to the ground by a tackle block and rope. The last load had been lowered and Ackley leaned against the railing to rest. Under his weight the railing gave way and he tumbled over backwards, striking the ground as described above.

Several persons who saw the accident went to his assistance, and found him unconscious. The ambulance was sent for but when it arrived the injured man was able to stand on his feet and also strenuously object to being taken to the hospital.

Dr. C. A. Haines was called and attended to the bruises on his face and shoulders. No bones were broken and he will be able to go to work in a few days. The fact that Ackley escaped with his life is considered miraculous by those who saw him fall.

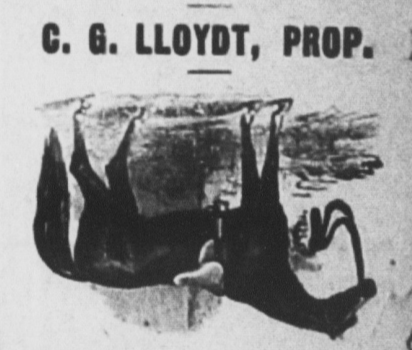
