**THOUSANDS OF CHINESE DIE.**  
Loss of Native Life and Property Near Hongkong Appalling.  
HONGKONG, Sept. 20. Though hundreds of Chinese boatmen and their families were saved by the police and civilians, several thousands of the native water dwellers perished in the typhoon, many within short distances of the shore.  
The losses in lives and property among the Chinese were appalling. The police stations in Hongkong are surrounded by Chinese identifying their dead. The families of the Hongkong boatmen live night and day on the sampans, and thousands of these are now homeless.  
The Chinese take the disaster calmly and show no manifestation of grief. One launch that was capsized had 120 Chinese on board. They were all drowned.  
The Anglican bishop of Hongkong, Dr. J. C. Hoare, was on the yacht Pomier, which stranded in Castle Peak bay. He was on his way to visit some neighboring islands when the storm broke and is reported missing.  
Most of the damage was wrought on the Kowloon peninsula. The losses are estimated at several million dollars. Over a thousand sampans and junks are missing from Hongkong alone. Wharves were swept away and houses collapsed. The military barracks are in ruins. The harbor is strewn with wreckage thrown up on shore.  
The British commodore at Hongkong reports that the British sloop Phoenix is hopelessly damaged. The steamer Montevale, belonging to the Canadian Pacific Railroad company, and the French torpedo boat Franqueville will probably both be refloated. The French torpedo boat Froude is expected to be a total wreck. A large sailing vessel was thrown almost on top of her.  
Latest estimates are that a thousand lives were lost during the typhoon and that the damage to property, public and private, will amount to millions of dollars. Twelve ships were sunk, twenty-four driven ashore, seven were damaged, and one-half of the native craft in port were sunk. The shipping trade has been paralyzed through lack of lighters.

**Adam Would Run For Governor.**  
BUFFALO, Sept. 20.--In response to a query from Norman E. Mack, member of the Democratic national committee for the state of New York, as to whether he would accept the gubernatorial nomination Mayor J. M. Adam replied "that if the Democratic party in convention assembled demands of any true and loyal Democrat that he serve his party and the people it is his duty to respond even against his personal preference and to stand or fall fighting in the good old fashioned way for his party and for his principles."

**Warren G. Elliott Buried.**  
BALTIMORE, Sept. 20.--The funeral of Warren G. Elliott, president of the Atlantic Coast Line company, who died at Watkins, N. Y., on Monday, took place here from old St. Paul's church. The services were conducted by Rev. E. Briggs Nash, rector in charge. The burial was at Green Mount cemetery.
