ETHAN B. MINIER

Athens—Ethan B. Minier, one of the early settlers of Milan, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Clara Weaver, in Westfield, Tioga Co., Tuesday, aged 87 years.

He was a man of strong characteristics, deeply religious and with the highest ideals of integrity. He was justice of the peace for several years and could have held many offices of trust had he so desired, for he had the unwavering confidence of the community in which he lived.

Later in life he resided for many years in Athens, until he became quite feeble when he went to Westfield, Pa., where he resided with his daughter, Mrs. Weaver, up to the time of his death.

He suffered a stroke of paralysis recently which was probably the cause of his death. He leaves a family of six surviving children, Justin L. and D. H. Minier of New Richmond, Wis., James C. of South Dakota, Dr. W. C. Minier of Boise City, Idaho, and Mrs. Clara Weaver of Westfield. The funeral services were held in Westfield, and his remains were buried in the Milan cemetery at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

His son, Justin L. Minier, came to Athens last evening and went to Milan this morning to complete the arrangements.

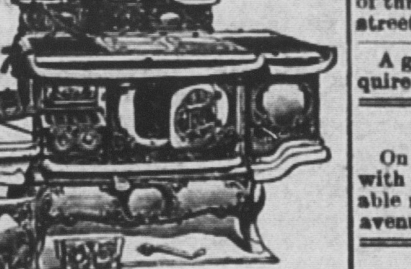
