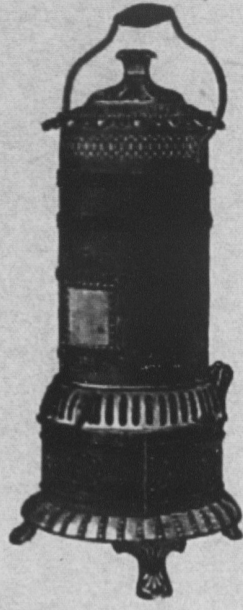

JOHNSON CASE IS AGAIN APPEALED

Condemned Man's Attorneys Will Make Another Effort for a New Trial

The Charles Johnson murder case has been taken to the supreme court by Messrs. Lilley & Wilson, counsel for the condemned man. The writ from the supreme court was filed in the Prothonotary's office yesterday and is returnable at Pittsburgh on October 29, and if the court which sits at that place shall adjourn before reaching the case, it will be heard at Philadelphia.

This is the second time that the Johnson case has been before the supreme court. The first time it was sent back to Judge Fanning for a new trial. Johnson was tried and convicted, and at the September court Judge Fanning pronounced sentence of death. He now has another chance for his life.

MAY LOSE AN EYE

A. B. Deininger, machinist at the Sayre shops, was struck in the right eye by a flying fragment of steel from a file which he was pounding Saturday morning. A fellow workman examined the eye and removed a small piece of the file from the lower lid. Mr. Deininger thinking the offending substance removed finished his day's work without much inconvenience although noticing dark spots before the injured eye. On Sunday morning his eye began to pain him and was much inflamed. He went to the office of Dr. Tuttle who found that the eye ball had been penetrated by a fragment of steel, causing extensive laceration of the lens and its capsule and lodged at some obscure part of the inner eye.

CAR WHEEL VICTIMS

Two victims of the cruel car wheels are lying on cots at the Packer hospital. Last night Frank Earl of Williamsport, was brought here with two toes crushed so badly that amputation was necessary. He had attempted to get off a freight train at Skinner's Eddy and fell beneath the cars, one of the wheels passing over his toes.

ENGINE ROD BROKE

An accident that fortunately did not result seriously, occurred on the Lehigh Valley between the stations at North Hartford and Dryden, Monday morning, when the rods of the engine attached to train No. 281 were knocked off, resulting in the wrecking of the cab and wrenching the driving wheels loose. Neither the engineer nor fireman was injured, and the engineer finally brought the train to a stop. Word was sent to Auburn and the wrecking crew from that place was sent to the scene of the accident. The crew found it necessary to tow the train to Auburn.

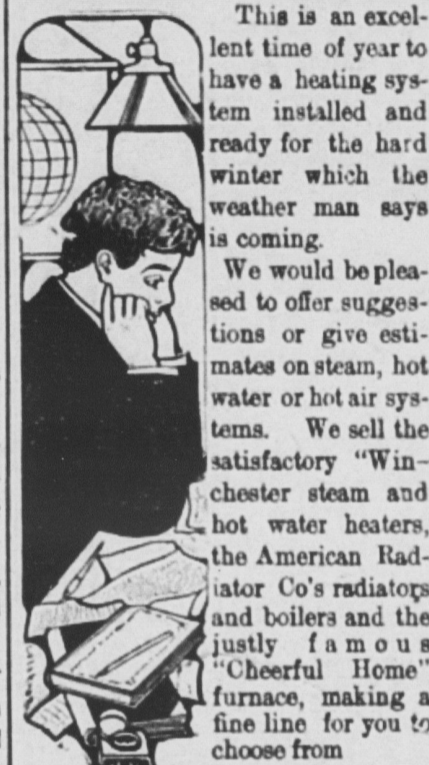
