INDEPENDENCE LEAGUE HAS HOT MEETING

League Has Split Into Two Factions—County Chairman Ejected from the Room

Waverly—In accordance with the prevailing spirit of dissension that seems to pervade all the political parties in Tioga county, the Independence League had an open rupture in its meeting of the county committee at Owego, which ended in the county chairman, Simon Zusmer, being ejected from the hall.

There are two factions of the league in the county, most of those in the west end of the county advocating the endorsement of Bryan L. Winters, the Republican nominee, and those from the vicinity of Owego, who desire the league to endorse the nomination of Fred J. Davis, the Democratic candidate. Simon Zusmer of Waverly is the county chairman of the Independence League, and had called a meeting to be held at Waverly last night, but J. A. Edgerton, who is the representative of the state caused W. N. Sweeney, the secretary of the league to call a meeting to be held at Owego last night. Mr. Zusmer states that this was done without his authority or consent. Yesterday afternoon the Waverly delegates were informed that the meeting will be held at Owego, and a new organization effected. So last night the committee from this part of the county went to Owego and gathered in the hall and at 8 o'clock the meeting was called to order by Mr. Zusmer. After a few minutes session the meeting was adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

Before those present had left the hall, the others who had not been present came in, and when informed that the meeting had been adjourned they objected that it had been called before the appointed time. The chairman then arose and began to tell them what he thought of them in no uncertain language. All attempts to silence him were of no avail and an officer was called in, it is said by W. N. Sweeney and Mr. Zusmer was then led from the hall.

The Owego faction and their followers then started to organize, with the intention of placing a full ticket in the field, but it was argued that inasmuch as Mr. Zusmer had been regularly elected chairman that any action that they might take without his being in the chair would be illegal, and so they adjourned without making any nominations.

The hall at 44 Lake street, where the meeting was held, was packed to the doors, and Owego was stirred up to an extent that is extremely rare for that quiet burg.

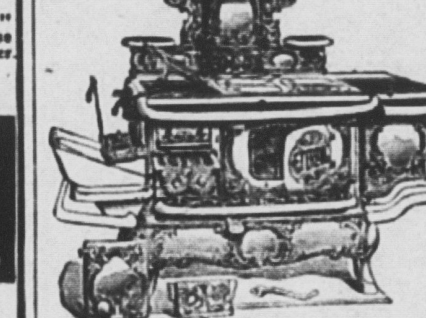
