PEACEFUL INVASION

President Orders 11,000 Men to Cuba.

TAFT PROCLAIMS ISLAND OURS.

Rebels Agree With Funston to Disarm, Return Property Annexed and Go to Their Homes—Cubans Happy Over Intervention.

HAVANA, Oct. 1.—Secretary of War Taft, on behalf of the president, has taken over the island of Cuba and has issued a proclamation to the Cubans that the United States would provisionally take charge of its affairs until its people could form constitutionally another republic.

THE GULF HURRICANE

Track of Great Storm Striven With Wrecks.

ABOUT TWO HUNDRED LIVES LOST

Warships Beached or Sunk at Pensacola—Thirty-eight Vessels Ashore in Mississippi Delta—Death and Ruin at Many Points.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 1.—Details of the great hurricane which swept over the gulf states show it to have been, in point of territory affected, property damaged and lives lost, one of the most disastrous the southern section of the country has ever experienced.

Disaster to Marines Reported. NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 1.—A wireless message has been received at the Norfolk navy yard stating that twenty-five marines and a marine sergeant have been killed in Cuba by the insurgents.

WRECKED THREE COACHES. New York Plier Hile Long Branch Express—Three Dead, Forty Hurt.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 1.—Running at great speed past a signal set against it and a flagman who was wildly waving a warning to the engineer, a New York express train bound for Philadelphia on the New York division of the Pennsylvania railroad crashed into a stalled Long Branch express at Edgington, nineteen miles north of this city.

Nineteen Condemned to Death. CRONSTADT, Oct. 1.—The sentences of the court martial on the sailors and others charged with participation in the mutiny at Cronstadt have been delivered.

Yale Boys' Dress Parade. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 1.—Parading the main streets dressed as ballet dancers, clowns, rough riders and in other disguises, students of Sheffield Scientific school of Yale university made trouble for the crowds of trolley cars and gave the police a sharp tussle near the city hall.

Small Packers Appeal to Wilson. WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Beginning today the railroads will refuse to accept meat in interstate commerce which does not bear the proper stamp of inspection from the department of agriculture.

Widow of Koslov Asks Mercy. ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 1.—The appeal for mitigation of the death sentence passed upon the assassin of General Koslov, who was killed in Petersburg park, has been joined by the general's widow.

River Jammed With Wreckage. MILTON, Fla., Oct. 1.—Milton was greatly damaged by the hurricane, the velocity of the wind at times being frightful. Trees, houses and fences were destroyed in all parts of the town.

Visitors of Washburn Wreck. DANVILLE, Ill., Oct. 1.—Vicent Waldman, nine years old, of Guelph, Ont., the seventh victim, died here from wounds received in the Washburn wreck at Catlin Station.

SIXTEEN BALLOONS SAIL AWAY.

Great Airship Race Starts From Tulleries, Paris.

PARIS, Oct. 1.—Sixteen balloons, averaging over 2,000 cubic meters capacity each and representing seven countries, sailed away from the Tuilleries gardens, in the heart of Paris, in the first competition for the Gordon Bennett cup for international aeronauts.

Massed military bands entertained the crowds with music while they waited. The start was preceded by the flight of hundreds of trial balloons and the losing of 5,000 homing pigeons.

Fort Morgan, in Mobile harbor, is a complete wreck, the loss there reaching \$100,000.

Fort St. Philip sustained \$100,000 damage. Four bodies not before counted have been found at Eden, and it is estimated that twenty-three lives have been lost from the oyster fleet around Cedar point, near Mobile.

Apprehension is still felt in some quarters for the safety of Gulfport, a town on the Louisville and Nashville just west of Biloxi, Miss., but the fear that there has been great loss of life there has died out.

The situation along the coast to the west of this city is now fairly well known. At Scranton, Miss., one church, the Odd Fellows hall and several buildings were blown down.

PRESIDENT'S RETURN

Roosevelt and Cabinet to Confer on Cuban Affairs.

DINES WITH TARS OF EVANS' FLEET

His Visit to Warship a Red Letter Day For Bluejackets, Who Send Him Cigars at Meal and Cheer His Departure.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The president and Mrs. Roosevelt, with Ethel, Archie and Quentin, their children, left Sagamore Hill for Washington at 9 o'clock this morning.

President Roosevelt returned to Oyster Bay on the Mayflower yesterday after being aboard forty-eight hours and witnessing the target practice of the north Atlantic fleet off Cape Cod.

The United States naval vessel Sylph, with Secretary Root on board, arrived in Washington last night.

All members of the president's cabinet except Secretary Taft are now in Washington, and the president has indicated his desire that they be present at a cabinet meeting which will be held at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

It is understood that the Cuban situation has influenced the president to hasten his return. The president previous to his departure had no statement to make on the situation and said that nothing in the dispatches received from Cuba could be made public.

The occasion of the president's participation in the target practice of Admiral Evans' fleet was the only time he had been away from his summer home at Sagamore Hill since his arrival there on July 1.

President Roosevelt's visit to the north Atlantic fleet off Cape Cod was a red letter day among the crews of the warships, and he left it with enthusiastic praise for the officers and crews.

The necessary orders were immediately issued, and the sailors jumped to their feet in surprise when they saw President Roosevelt walk on the after gun deck and take his place at a table where he and his guests had the same mess that was being served to the sailors at the surrounding tables.

Train Wrecked by Storm. WESTVILLE, Fla., Oct. 1.—This town has been entirely cut off from the outside world since Wednesday, the storm raging here Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Explosion Under East River. NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—In a dynamite explosion under the East river subway tunnel, which is being constructed from Brooklyn to the Battery, New York, John McLaughlin was struck by flying rock and received injuries from which he died.
