Al Adams' Death Fit End to Bis Ill Spent Life. NEW YORK, Oct. 2.-Al Adams, the

policy king whom the late Norton God-dard sent to Sing Sing, committed suicide in his apartments at the Ansonia. For thirty years head of a penny swindle game; for eighteen months a convict, making mats in a prison workshop; since then a backer of bucket shops and for nearly twoscope years a successful real estate operator, he shothimself through the right temple.

Adams was found lying on the floo of his bedroom. He had fired the shot standing in front of a mirror and had fallen backward over a chair near his

The reason given for Adams' suicide was despondency over the ill fame be earned by his connection with the polley game and over the heavy failure of bucket shop and mining ventures in which he was the principal backer.

According to Coroner Harburger, however, letters found in Adams' room indicated that he died worth from \$8. 000,000 to \$10,000,000. Al Adams is best known as the policy

### RUNAWAY TROLLEY CAR.

one Infant Killed and a Score Hurt In Wreck at Yonkers, N. Y.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.-An infant was tilled and a score of men and women injured, five or six dangerously, last night when a runaway car of the Yonkers Street railway dashed down the steep incline of McLane avenue and jumped the track at a sharp turn at the foot of the hill, turned over, burying its passengers in the wreckage.

Fifteen injured were removed to St. Joseph's hospital and nearly as many more to St. John's. Of the injured a few, it is feared, may die.

The mother was seriously injured.

The accident was due to the breaking of a brake chain. When the chain sted Park near Craubrook, Kent, at snapped the car bounded forward, increasing its momentum rapidly as it covered the eighth of a mile incline.

The terrified passengers, fearing to jump, clung to their seats until the bottom of the hill was reached. At this point there is a sharp turn, and the car, leaving the irons, cleared the opposite track and turned turtle. Many of the passengers were pinioned in the wreck and suffered much before they could be extricated.

PARIS, Oct. 2.- A semiofficial an nouncement of the result of the great airship race for the James Gordon Bennett cup for international aeronauts has been given out as follows: Winner, Lieutenant Frank P. Lahm of America with the balloon United

with the balloon Walhalla. Dispatches from London say that Lieutenant Frank P. Lahm, Sixth cay alry, U. S. A., the American competitor and winner in the balloon race, desconded seven miles south of Whitby, about fifty miles north of Hull, at 3:30 yesterday afternoon.

Lieutenant Luhm said he had beer carried by way of Caen across the channel to Chichester. The actual crossing took from 11 o'clock at night until 3 in the morning. He then passed to the northward; but, finding that he was being carried toward the open sea. he decided to alight. Owing to the dryness of the moors his anchors at first would not hold, and the balloon passed dangerously near some farm buildings. Lieutenant Lahm's balloon was in

the air for twenty-three hours. Professor Huntington, one of the English contestants, in the Zepbyr, landed at Sittingbourne, Kent. He had a trying ordeal in crossing the channel, which took him eight hours. Other wise his voyage was uneventful and successful.
