Disreputable Quartette Were Annoying Residents by Disorderly Conduct

Three men and a woman occupied berths in the borough bug house this forenoon, charged with being vagrants and annoying residents in the vicinity of the Owen-shire place. This morning residents of that locality complained to the police authorities that a woman and three men were conducting themselves in a disorderly and indecent manner. It is alleged that the quartette had occupied an orchard near the cove all night, and that their presence there this morning was highly undesirable. They found the woman fast asleep on one side of an apple tree, while on the other side one of the men was nestling soundly in the arms of Morpheus. ### ATTENDING UNITED STATES COURT

Chief Walsh and Others Went to Auburn Today as Witnesses in Counterfeit Case

Chief of Police James Walsh, John Rowland, John Johnson, John Hanley, Frank Doud, "Josh" White and A. B. Barner went to Auburn this morning where they are summoned as witnesses in the United States District Court in the case of Walter O'Dell, charged by the government authorities with uttering and circulating counterfeit coin.

A year ago this last summer two men arrived in Sayre early one morning and a short time afterward several counterfeit coins were found in the possession of parties who had business deals with the men. "Josh" White, the porter at the Wilbur house, was given a counterfeit coin in payment for a shoe shine, and attempts were made by the men to circulate spurious coins, consisting mostly of half dollars and quarters, in several business places.

### CHARGES HUSBAND WITH ASSAULT

Mrs. McCracken Alleges That She Was Beaten and Kicked Into Insensibility

Yesterday afternoon Constable Spencer Brougham went to Towanda and arrested John C. McCracken on a charge of beating his wife, Jessie McCracken. The McCrackens have been living apart for some time and early last winter the husband began suit for a divorce. The proceedings are still pending. In the meantime Mrs. McCracken caused her husband's arrest, charging him with failing to support his two children. McCracken gave bail to appear before Judge Fanning and the judge ordered him to pay his wife \$12 per month for the support of the children. The judge also gave McCracken the privilege of seeing his children occasionally. Saturday night he went to the home of his wife in South Waverly, and he remained over night. Sunday morning the pair quarreled, during which Mrs. McCracken alleges that her husband knocked her down and kicked her into insensibility.

Yesterday morning the woman appeared before Justice Carey and demanded a warrant for McCracken's arrest. She exhibited a highly discolored eye and her face bore other evidences of having been badly treated. The warrant was issued and placed in the hands of Constable Brougham and he went to Towanda as above stated. McCracken was arraigned last night, and acting under the instructions of William Maxwell, Esq., entered bail in the sum of \$200 for a hearing on Friday next, G. C. Bristol qualifying as bondsman.

### SLIGHT BLAZE IN STAR LAUNDRY

Fire Broke Out in Drier Room, But Is Easily Controlled By the Department

Spontaneous combustion was the probable cause of a fire which broke out in the drier room of the Star Steam laundry shortly before 8 o'clock this morning. The laundry is conducted by Charles A. Catlin, and shortly after the force began working smoke began to issue from the drier room in large quantities. In an incredible short space of time the whole lower floor was completely filled with smoke, and an alarm of fire was sent in. The firemen responded promptly and a stream of water soon succeeded in controlling the fire to the drier room. The loss is placed at \$200, covered by insurance.
