WILL VACATE ITS PRESENT LOCATION

Sayre Postoffice to Be Removed to the Richards Block About November First

This morning Postmaster Bonfoey received a letter from the postal department at Washington instructing him to vacate the quarters used as a postoffice at the present time and remove to the north room in the Richards block on lower Desmond street. For some time it has been known that there was to be a change in the location of the Sayre postoffice. While it does not appear that the present location was considered undesirable by the citizens of Sayre, the officials at Washington did not wish to pay the rent demanded. Therefore, it was decided to make a change and a new location was secured. The postoffice has been located at the corner of Lockhart street and North Lehigh avenue for nearly five years, and the location has been considered central. The new location will also be looked upon as a central point and there will be little cause for dissatisfaction on the part of anyone. The room to which it will be removed will be appropriately furnished, a new fireproof vault is to be installed, and all the necessary paraphernalia, including a power canceling machine will be furnished by the government. The change will probably be made about the first of November.

SAYRE BREWING CO. ELECT OFFICERS

Local Business Enterprise Which Is Rapidly Forging to the Front.

The annual meeting of the Sayre Brewing Company (Ltd) was held on the first of the month and the following officers were elected: T. P. Maney, president; Joe Hinko, vice president; J. B. Maney, treasurer; James Adam, secretary.

Charles Lenhard, the former treasurer of the company, has retired from the company all his stock having been purchased by other members of the company.

The brewing company is now entering upon its third year and has proven to be a paying investment. The product is finding ready sale throughout this section, and as the months go by the business is being rapidly extended. From 12 to 15 men are employed about the plant and they receive first-class wages. The enterprise promises to be one of the leading industries of Sayre.

FLAGS IN BAD SHAPE

LEHIGH MONEY IS STILL MISSING

Mystery Surrounding Disappearance of Nearly \$2000 Not Yet Unraveled

Mystery still surrounds the stealing of nearly \$2000 from the Lehigh Valley station at Ithaca early Monday morning while the telegraph operator, Bert Bryant, was asleep.

Since the burglary it has been asked why so much money was left in the money drawer. It is the rules of the company that such large amounts shall be deposited in the safe at the freight house, but for some inexplicable reason the money from the sale of the excursion tickets was allowed to remain in the money drawer at the ticket office.

Byrant, the operator, explains his falling asleep by saying that he was cold in the station and that he wrapped himself in his overcoat and lay down on the desk where the operators work, not intending to sleep.

Although he was planning to leave Ithaca, having secured another situation, he says that he will remain in the city until the affair is settled, or the mystery unraveled.

The officers of the Lehigh have been working incessantly, and a suspect has been placed under arrest at Watkins.

One link in the chain of evidence which the officers are slowly gathering is the fact that one of the keys of the office which should be in the possession of one of the employes is missing and he is unable to account for its absence. Important developments are expected within a day or two.

MONTHLY SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

It Was Held in the High School Building Last Night

The regular monthly meeting of the Sayre borough school directors was held in the high school building last night, Thompson, Whittle, Maddox, Baltz, Shedden and Hutchinson answering to roll call.

Immediately after the reading of the minutes a large number of bills were paid including the teachers' and janitor's salaries.

John Walt, who has been janitor of the Fourth ward school building since the beginning of the fall term, tendered his resignation which was accepted. S. L. Garrison was appointed to take the place made vacant by Mr. Walt.

New flags were ordered for all the school buildings in the borough, it having been reported that they were all in bad condition with the exception of the one on the Milltown building, and that had been stolen.

The report of Tax Collector Plumstead showed that the sum of \$18,599.47 had been levied for taxes, of which \$13,563.65, has been collected. Deducting the tax collector's commission and the five per cent. allowed taxpayers for paying before specified time the amount collected is \$12,695. There remains to collect the sum of \$5,904.07. On the building fund there still remains to collect the sum of \$2,420.34.

The report of the treasurer shows that there is \$8,936.00 in his hands at the present time.

Superintendent Stetler's report shows that 728 pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the past month; the average attendance for the month was 1,179 against 1,160 for the same month last year. The total enrollment this year is 1,280 as against 1,215 last year.

A motion was made and carried instructing the secretary to pay the sum of \$460 interest in the National bank of Sayre.

Black Diamond Legion, N. P. L., will hold a public pay-off on Friday evening next. There will be about \$1,200 in dividend checks distributed and light refreshments will be served.

Pleasant Name. Manufacturers pleasantly name shoddy "manufactured wool." The term is speciously descriptive, for the material is made from wools which have passed through the process of manufacture. Soft worsted rags of any kind—old stockings, or soft clothes made from long-stapled wools—are cleaned and torn into soft stuff in a machine resembling somewhat the ordinary willow machine.

Too High for Sleep. Loss of sleep proves to be the curious effect that may limit man's mountainglimbing. Dr. Bullock Workman mentions that in his camp in the Himalayas at 19,358 feet, members of his party were kept awake by lack of breath, and on doing off would suddenly awake gasping. He concludes that inability to sleep may itself be sufficient to keep climbers from going beyond 23,000 to 25,000 feet.

Gypsy King. "King" Thomas Costello, chief of a noted tribe of gypsies, died in Newark, N. J., recently. For seven generations a Costello has been on the "throne." Thomas succeeded his brother three years ago. He will be succeeded by his three-year-old son, but the affairs of the tribe will be managed by a regency till he reaches his majority.

Principal Thomas, of the Burlington (Vt.) high school, and his teachers, finding that 40 per cent. of the boys used tobacco habitually, and desiring to reduce the practice, have agreed that no pupil who uses tobacco can hold a school office or be a member of any organization, including athletic and social clubs.

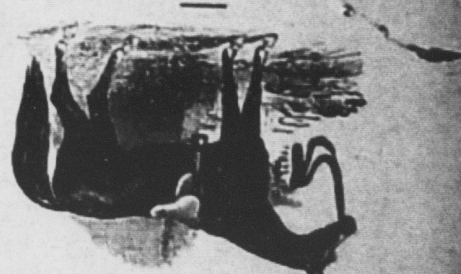
