ROBBED JAP BANK.

Thieves at Erieco Best Manager to Death and Get \$5,000 in Gold. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—Two robbers entered the Kimmon Ginko, a Japanese bank, also known as the Golden Gate bank, at 1588 O'Farrell street, and after fatally beating S. Urakata, the manager of the bank, and seriously injuring A. Sasaki, a clerk, with a piece of gas pipe escaped with \$5,000 in gold. Manager Urakata died two hours later from his injuries. Urakata was acting as teller of the bank. After striking down their victims the robbers dragged them to a poorly lighted room in the rear of the bank. There the prostrate forms of the men were found lying in a pool of blood that streamed from their wounds, and near by was a piece of gas pipe a foot in length. Chief of Police Dignan soon had detailed on the case every available detective and policeman in the city. He advanced the theory that the robbers are the same men who recently killed Pfisterer and Friede, merchants, in their stores in this city.

HOME RULE IN IRELAND.

United Irish League Elects Officers at Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 4.—During the session of the United Irish league convention here a number of resolutions were adopted, among which was one reaffirming the well known principles of the league toward home rule in Ireland and pledging its members to continue to strive as they have in the past to bring about better conditions in that country. The following officers were elected: President, Patrick J. Ryan of Philadelphia; vice presidents, Patrick Egan of New York, Michael J. Redding of Boston, Edward Devoy of St. Louis and John Fitzpatrick of New Orleans; secretary, John O'Callaghan of Boston; treasurer, T. B. Fitzpatrick of Boston. The national executive committee was re-elected. Patriotism of a substantial kind was manifested when the convention amid great enthusiasm pledged the organization to raise \$100,000 for the cause of home rule for Ireland within the next two years.

ROOSEVELT AT HARRISBURG.

Attends Dedication of New State Capitol. HARRISBURG, Pa., Oct. 4.—President Roosevelt and party attended the dedication of the new capitol building here today, met with a great reception at the capitol of Pennsylvania and made a speech at the ceremony. The president left Washington at 7:50 o'clock this morning, reaching Harrisburg several hours later. During the afternoon on his return to Washington the president will stop at York and visit the county fair there and make an impromptu speech. Washington will be reached early in the evening. Senator Knox accompanied the president on the trip. It begins to look like there is coming a sort of breaking with China. In that case, something will crash.

GEORGE H. ROPP

Waverly--George H. Ropp died yesterday afternoon at about 4 o'clock at his home on Clark street. His death was due to dropsy, from which he had suffered for some time. Death came unexpectedly, for while he had been ill for some time his condition had improved considerably during the past week. He was 68 years of age and had lived in Waverly for the last 24 years, having moved here from Renova, Pa. He was a machinist by trade and had worked at the Sayre shops for a number of years. He is survived by his wife and three sons, George, Edward and Clifford, all of Waverly. Two brothers and two sisters live at York, Pa. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 3 and the remains will be buried at St. James cemetery.

FIRE DEPARTMENT TO HOLD NIGHT PARADE
