### NEW SEWER PLANS HAVE BEEN RECEIVED

Trustees Hold Meeting Last Night—Order Large Number Sidewalks Laid

Waverly—The board of trustees held a regular adjourned meeting last evening, those present being President Lawrence, and Trustees Brown, Brougham, and Farley.

The report of the clerk showed that \$15 had been realized from licenses and dog taxes.

The current bills for the month and quarter were ordered paid, and the balance due on the paving job, \$2,910, was also ordered paid.

A communication was received from Chicago containing the text of a resolution, with the request that the board pass favorably upon it.

The proposed resolution was in the form of a petition to congress that it was the opinion of the board that postal savings banks should be established in order that there should be a safe depository for small savings.

The members did not have sufficient knowledge of the subject to act intelligently and the matter was held over for further consideration.

Miss Ida Tannery asked permission to distribute bills, the same having been prohibited by a recent ordinance. She stated that she had made a contract to do some distributing and wanted to carry it out.

Acting on the advice of the attorney, the board decided it had no power to grant permission to violate the terms of an ordinance.

The matter of crossing over or under the Erie at West Broad street was discussed, and the committee having the matter in charge was given more time to investigate.

The president stated that the revised plans for the sewer had been received from the engineer and were ready for inspection. The first set of plans made no provision for a disposal plant, and the state health commission refused to approve them on that account; but the new plans meet that objection.

A large number of sidewalks were ordered laid or repaired.

It was also ordered that the water main be extended on Howard street.

### TIOGA HOUSE PORTER HAS LEFT TOWN

He Took \$20 of Another Man's Money With Him

Waverly—"Bill Hollenback, who up to last night was the porter at the Tioga house, has evidently gone on a vacation. At least he has not been seen since last night, and it is strongly suspected that he has left town. The cause of his sudden departure seems to be accounted for in part at least by the fact that he had in his possession the sum of \$20, which belonged to another man. The owner of the cash was stopping at the Tioga hotel, and he entrusted the above mentioned sum to the said Hollenback for the purpose of getting it changed. He didn't come back, and it is supposed that the possession of so much legal tender was too much for him to resist.


