STOLEN MONEY WAS FOUND YESTERDAY

Ely Accompanies Lehigh Officers to Places Where He Had Concealed Proceeds of Ithaca Station Robbery

The money which was stolen from the Lehigh ticket office at Ithaca on Monday morning was recovered yesterday and is now in the hands of the authorities at Ithaca.

Yesterday morning Ely made a confession in which he told of the manner in which he did the job, but he could not tell where the money was. He insisted, however, that he could take the officers to places where the money had been concealed, and yesterday afternoon Chief of Police Van Order of Ithaca and Detectives J. J. Johnson and T. B. Shaffer of this place secured an automobile and taking Ely with them, drove toward Watkins. When near that place Ely pointed to a large stone weighing about 20 pounds, and told the officers that they would find part of the money there. The stone was rolled over and underneath it was \$717 in bills. The party returned to Ithaca and underneath the platform of the freight house, buried in a shallow hole, was found the remainder of the stolen money.

The story of the finding of the money, and of the efforts made by the detectives to locate it, reads more like a yellow covered novel than actual facts. Ely was arrested on Tuesday night at a hotel in Watkins, where he had taken a room. He at first denied all knowledge of the crime and told stories to the officers which later were proven to be falsehoods. In order to ascertain whether or not Ely was telling the truth an automobile was secured and the detectives drove over the entire route which Ely said that he took when he left Ithaca. The detectives visited places where Ely said he had been, but found that he had not been telling the truth. Then the woman who furnished him breakfast a few hours after the robbery came to the front and when Ely was confronted by her he broke down and confessed.

When suspicion first pointed toward him the officers were unable to locate him. Finally it was learned that he had been keeping company with a girl who lived a short distance from Ithaca. Detective Shaffer communicated with her by telephone. By impersonating a friend of Ely's he succeeded in ascertaining from the girl that Ely was in Watkins. He also secured much more valuable information concerning Ely from the unsuspecting girl.

The recovery of the money is due to the energy and quick witted tactics employed by Detectives Johnson and Shaffer, ably assisted by Chief of Police Van Order of Ithaca and Willard Kent, the district attorney of Tompkins county. The local officers are loud in their praise of the Tompkins county officials, who offered many valuable suggestions and spent no end of time in helping to locate the money and the thief.

One interesting feature in connection with the roll of bills which was found near Watkins was the fact that a gang of men were working on the road about 500 feet from the rock under which the money was concealed. The men were using a road scraper and had the officers been a half hour later the machine would have scraped the money and stone into the road, in which event it probably never would have been found.

THE BRAKES WERE SET

Waverly—Four prominent residents of Waverly were out for an automobile ride a few days since, and ran the machine to the vicinity of Wilawanna. At that point they had to cross the D. L. & W. tracks. Just as they were upon the crossing with the machine standing over both tracks so that one pair of wheels was on the east and the other on the westbound track, and a fast passenger train approaching, the machine stopped, and all attempts to move it proved futile. After struggling with it for some time with the passenger train getting nearer every second, a section boss came to the rescue. The combined force of the section men and the four occupants of the car, 14 in number, succeeded in removing the car from the track just in time to save it from the train. They then examined the machine in a less hurried manner and found that the brakes were set, and then the reason for the auto's tenacious hold upon the track was revealed to four surprised and chagrined citizens.

LEVY PAYING TAX

Waverly—At the meeting of the board of trustees last Thursday, the frontage tax for the new pavement was levied. The whole job amounts to about \$6500, and is apportioned as follows: The abutting owners pay 80 per cent, that is 40 per cent on each side of the street, and the remaining 20 per cent by the taxpayers at large. This makes the share of the village \$1300, and the part to be paid by the abutting owners \$5200.

NEW MACHINERY

Waverly—The meat firm of Rolfe & Ganther received the machinery necessary to make sausage yesterday, and will be prepared to serve the public with the home made article in the future. They have fitted up a room for the purpose of sausage manufacture. It is paved with concrete, and has all sanitary arrangements.

Waverly—The various calls at the police station have been changed, and have been the cause of some wondering to those residing within hearing distance of the town hall. One stroke of the bell was the police call formerly used, but after the fire alarm system had been installed a break in the line was indicated by one stroke of the bell, and in order to distinguish between the two, the police call was changed to two strokes. Noon hour is now indicated by three strokes.

KICKED IN HEAD

Waverly—While playing football on the Waverly high school team at Athens yesterday Albert Flynn was kicked on the back of the head and rendered unconscious. He was taken to a doctor's office, and after a time revived and was brought home to Waverly. He has recovered from the injury, and it is not likely that any bad results will follow.

GAME CANCELLED

Waverly—A game of football was scheduled to be played this afternoon between the Athens and Waverly teams at this place, but was cancelled by the Athens management last night. No satisfactory reason for this move was given, and it is the opinion of the Waverly aggregation that it is a case of cold feet.

WAVERLY DEFEATED

Waverly—The Waverly high school football team went to Athens yesterday afternoon and played against the high school team of that town. The Athens team won the game by a score of 11 to 0.
