SIGNATURES SECURED

Waverly—Edward L. Rice of New York city was in town yesterday securing the signatures to the nomination papers that will place the Independence League ticket on the ballot. He was in Waverly for seven hours and during that time he secured 258 signatories. These, taken with those that have already been obtained at Owego, make enough to secure the placing of the nominees on the ballot in Tioga county. He spent six days at Owego and during that time found only 153 voters who were willing to swear that they would support the ticket at the polls. He was greatly hampered while securing names at the county seat. One farmer came out of a cornfield, signed the paper and charged 25 cents for the time he lost from his work. Another collected 25 cents for his trouble in climbing down from an apple tree to sign the papers. Mr. Rice did not expect to find many at Waverly who would aid the ticket, but they came in at a great rate.

"MY WIFE'S FAMILY"

Stage fright is generally associated with amateurs and first night productions, but that it is not confined to those bounds is attested by Miss Mattie Edward, who has played the role of mother-in-law Arabella Nagg in "My Wife's Family," ever since the first production of the piece. "We were playing in New Or-leans," relates Miss Edwards, "and during my long speech, one night, in the second act, a woman came into the auditorium and marched clear down to the front row of the orchestra chairs, disturbing a lot of people, and then fussed around with a big hat for several minutes. I absent mindedly allowed my eye to follow her, and the first thing I knew I forgot my lines—the lines I had spoken nightly for two years I was lost completely. I never ex-perienced such a feeling before, and I do not care to again. Finally in desperation I reached over and took hold of Miss George, who was playing opposite me. She had never seen me act that way before and thought I was going to drop dead. She put her arms about me, and then, in an instant my lines came back to me and we finished the scene. This was my first at-tack of stage fright, and it came near breaking up the performance completely." Will appear at the Koomis soon.

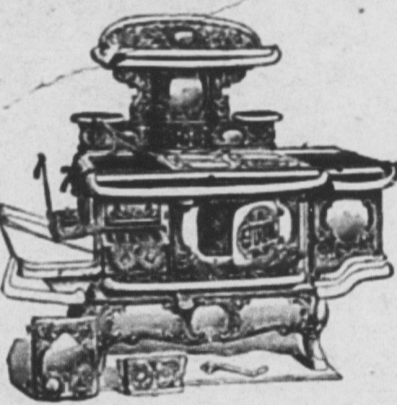

UNION OFFICERS KILLED. Strike Riot at Buckingham, Canada, Ends Fatally. BUCKINGHAM, Que., Oct. 9.—The McLaren Lumber company endeavored to break a strike which has been in progress at their mills here for a month, and strikers and detectives engaged in a battle with guns that lasted some hours. Two strikers were killed and one detective and thirteen other persons injured. The dead are said to be President Bellingier and the vice president of the Lumbermen's union.

Troops Sent to Quell Riot. OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—Fifty men of the Forty-third battalion, fifty men from the governor general's foot guards and a machine gun detachment from the Forty-third battalion have been sent to Buckingham, Que., where a riot was reported between strikers and strike breakers. PRETTY GIRLS AS USHERS. Innovation at Manayunk Church Arguments its Treasury. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9.—Ebeneszer Methodist Episcopal church, Manayunk, was crowded to the doors Sunday evening when a dozen pretty young women assumed their duties as ushers and also took up the collection. Many of the strangers present were young men. The young women were gowned in white and performed their duties gracefully. The pastor, the Rev. Everett D. Decker, is enthusiastic over the success of the new ushers and after the service said that it would surely increase the permanent church attendance. The collection was much larger than usual. Each girl turned in her plate heaped with silver coin and notes.

Trouble Feared at Cienfuegos. HAVANA, Oct. 9.—The notorious condition of factional ill feeling which has existed at Cienfuegos since the presidential campaign of 1905 and which then resulted in the deaths of Congressman Villuendas and Chief of Police Blance increased during the recent revolution to such an extent that the return of the rebels from the field is now causing a dangerous condition, which the provisional government considers it is highly necessary to end. With this in view Governor Taft last night sent Consul General Steinhart to Cienfuegos with authority to take any action that he may deem advisable in the matter.

Archbishop Against Modus Vivendi. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Oct. 9.—Popular anger against the modus vivendi arranged by the United States and British governments relating to the Newfoundland herring fishery is growing. There is a general feeling that the compromise arrived at was a back-down on the part of the British ministry. Archbishop Howley, the Roman Catholic prelate, speaking at a parochial festival, declared the modus vivendi a shameful betrayal of the colony's interests and advocated agitation throughout the colony against it.
