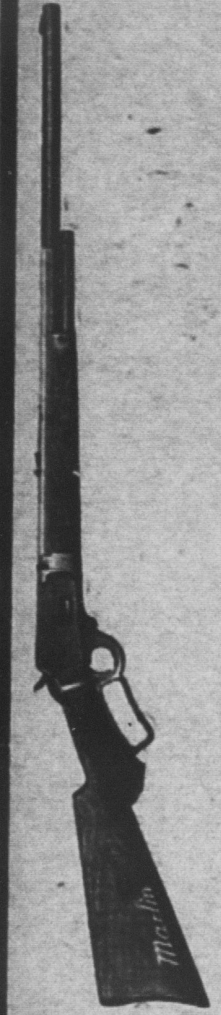

ELY IS HELD TO THE GRAND JURY

Young Man Who Robbed Ithaca Station Ruined By His Love for Poker Game

Clarence Ely was arraigned in Recorder's court at Ithaca yesterday on a charge of Burglary of the Lehigh Valley station at Ithaca of nearly \$1,200. Ely waived examination and was held to the grand jury. The bail bond of Bert T. Bryant, who was also held in connection with the robbery, was taken up and the case so far as he is concerned is concluded. Ely, in the confession which he made to the police officials and railroad detectives shortly after he was arrested, completely exonerates Bryant.

Ely's downfall is attributed to poker playing. His relatives are eminently respectable. Clarence was a sickly boy and his brothers paid for his tuition when he was learning telegraphy. He secured a situation quickly, but shortly afterward was induced to enter a saloon in Watkins where they played poker for money. Soon he found himself in debt, and in order to keep up he borrowed money. The money was due when he conceived the idea of robbing the Lehigh station.

On account of his youth, and its having been his first offense, it is thought that he will escape with a sentence to the reformatory at Elmira.

ENGINE CRASHED INTO CABOOSE

Dense Fog Prevented the Engineer From Seeing Ahead

A heavy compound engine drawing a westbound freight train crashed into a caboose in the lower end of the Sayre yards this morning. The caboose was thrown on top of a carload of coal and was badly damaged. No one was in the caboose at the time of the accident. The engine was in charge of Engineer Ben Wandell, and the train was entering the westbound yard. A dense fog prevented the engineer from seeing the caboose.

BRYANT REFUSES TO MAKE GOOD

Company Claims He Is Short One Hundred and Forty Dollars, Including Small Amount Stolen by Ely

Bert Bryant, the night ticket agent at Ithaca, who slept while Clarence Ely robbed the money drawer of nearly \$1,200, was released at Ithaca yesterday on the charge of complicity in the robbery, but will probably be proceeded against by the bonding company who became responsible for his performing the duties of his office according to the rules laid down by the railroad company. The company claims that Ely is short to the extent of \$140, money realized from the sale of tickets, and including a small portion of the sum stolen by Ely, which the detectives failed to recover. The company have called upon Bryant to make the shortage good. It is understood that he has refused to do this and that the railway officials will call upon the bonding company to settle, in which event Bryant will be in more trouble.

PURELY POLITICAL

If You Like a Square Deal, You Should Support the "Square Deal" Candidate for Congress—Geo. W. Kipp

The platform on which Mr. Kipp, the Democratic nominee for congress, comes before the voters, with reference to his attitude toward the present national administration, admits of but one construction. Mr. Kipp expresses himself clearly on this point in his letter of acceptance. He says: "I can here pledge my word and honor that in every reform measure of the character of which Mr. Roosevelt has been advocating in the past, he will have my full and hearty support." Could Mr. Roosevelt or his ardent supporters ask for anything more? After this avowal on the part of the Democratic nominee is there a single Republican who can conscientiously refuse to support him on the grounds that a Republican congressman is needed from this district solely for the purpose of supporting national measures?

The "gang" papers are making a great noise over "holding up Roosevelt's hands," and other appeals to rank partisanship are coming. Soon they will be telling the people that Republicans who support the fusion ticket are party wreckers. But the reverse of this is true. The Republican who votes to throw the gang out of office is a patriot whose courage should receive the highest commendation from all decent persons. If Republicans will only rise up in their might and cast out the evil of bossism in this state, and its counterpart, Lillieism in Bradford county, there need be no fear of the party being wrecked. Cast out the political jobbers and any party will be strengthened. It is particularly true regarding the Republican party in Bradford county.

Thomas Kilrow, Susquehanna county's champion political gymnast, shows that he has not forgotten how to do amazing stunts in conventions and conferences. It is he who induced the Lincoln party congress in his county to "endorse" Lillie, the machine candidate. There are reasons for Kilrow's action. A quarrel of long standing exists between Congressman C. Fred Wright and Kilrow, and since the difference of opinion arose between these two, the last named has practically been shorn of what political power he ever possessed. Now Kilrow has come to Lillie's aid, and if Lillie should be elected it is reasonable to suppose that Kilrow will dole out the plums in Susquehanna county in place of Wright.

In referring to the candidates for Congress, the Monroe Democrat has the following to say: "G. W. Kipp for congress is one of the best nominations that could possibly have been made, and there is a strong probability of his election. Mr. Kipp is exceedingly popular in Bradford county, also in Wayne county, where he formerly resided and where he was county commissioner. His opponent, Mial Lillie, the present congressman, is already on the run. His fences are badly down in all the counties, and more especially in his home county of Bradford. He is nothing if not a boss, and there are more and more people who are getting more and more tired of bosses and ringsters."

It is amusing to view the frantic efforts which some of Lillie's men have been making to corral the Sayre shop vote. It will require more than one vote in favor of free passes to capture the railroad vote. The Sayre shop vote will take care of itself this year.
