#### HUGHES AT CANANDAIGUA.

Received at Geneva With Boom of Big Guns.

CANANDAIGUA, N. Y., Oct. 12.—Charles E. Hughes, the Republican nominee for governor, is touring Ontario county, making an address at Geneva. The weather was stormy, and snow fell continuously.

In the face of these wintry conditions the crowds which greeted the candidate on his arrival both at Geneva and here were large and thoroughly enthusiastic ones.

At Geneva the arrival of the Hughes train was marked by the boom of cannon and the playing of two bands. The Geneva audience filled the theater and listened with intense interest to his discussion of the issues of the campaign.

Mr. Hughes took several new leads in his address and dwelt with particular emphasis upon the importance of electing the right sort of men to the state legislature. He declared he was glad that his opponent's appeal to patriotism came at a time of prosperity when the people are not looking for work or food. The telling points in his speech were loudly applauded, and at the conclusion of the address he was cheered.

The trip from Geneva to Canandaigua was made by special trolley cars, Mr. Hughes being the guest of Assemblyman J. L. Burnett.

At Geneva Mr. Hughes said in part: "When I see an audience like this gathered upon such an inclement day I am satisfied that the people are thinking about something, and when the American people set about thinking they generally do right."

"I am very glad that I am about to stand before you not simply as a Republican, although I am loyal to the Republican party."

"I said the other night in Brooklyn that I thought it was the first qualification of a good Republican to be an American, and then I found I was reported as saying that the first qualification of an American was to be a Republican. The remark was commented upon despite what I had said in my speech of acceptance, that, although a Republican, I was a citizen first and that the issue of this campaign is good citizenship."

Mr. Hughes goes from here to Penn Yan and Seneca Falls today and Amsterdam tomorrow.

#### OLD SLAVE PRISON FOUND.

Philadelphia Subway Workmen unearth Girard's secret Dungeons.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—Subway workmen digging deep beneath Water street above Market for the foundations of a tunnel station uncovered at a depth of a hundred feet Stephen Girard's old slave prison.

The pen is composed of narrow cells in three tiers, with three feet corridors between the heavy walls. Iron bars cover the windows, and in each cell are unclean.

Directly above the dungeon is the house of Stephen Girard, the eccentric millionaire who gave Girard college to Philadelphia and whose estate is now valued in the hundreds of millions.

It has long been a local tradition that Girard drove a brisk slave trade and that some of his gigantic fortune sprang from barter in the blacks.

A curious circumstance connected with the discovery is that for years a legend of haunting has hung around old Water street between Market and Arch.

Stories of underground shrieks, chain rattling, blows and all the other time-honored manifestations have been told, and it is a fact that houses near the old Girard place cannot be rented because of this.
