### TEAM RAN AWAY, HORSE BADLY HURT

Mixup in Alley Yesterday Afternoon Which Resulted Disastrously

Two teams belonging to John C. Osborn, proprietor of the Osborn Warehouse, ran away yesterday afternoon, resulting in one of the horses being seriously injured. One of the teams was engaged in hauling ashes from the alley between North Lehigh and Elmer avenues. The driver threw the end board of the wagon on the ground and the team became frightened. The animals tore down the alley and ran into Osborn's other team which was standing in front of the barn. The latter team also became badly frightened and before Mr. Osborn's son, who was standing near, could prevent, they too dashed away. They ran into a post in the rear of the Valley House and stopped. One of the horses was badly cut about the legs, while the other one was also badly bruised. John Burt, the veterinary surgeon of Waverly, stated that he had seldom attended horses cut up so badly in a runaway, and no bones broken. The team which caused the trouble was caught by Mr. Osborn's boy before they did any further damage. Mr. Osborn says that his driver is looking for another job.

### GAME PLENTIFUL

Next Monday will be the opening day of the season when hunters will be lawfully allowed to kill pheasants. Sportsmen are having a favorable season, and from every section come good accounts of the vast quantities of game this year. From advices received by the state game department, pheasants, wild turkey, deer, quail, grey squirrels and rabbits are in abundance. It is reported that the deer in the state are in greater number, but is said many are being killed out of season. The increase in the amount of game is attributed to the fact that there have been few forest fires this year, owing to the increased vigilance of the forest wardens.

Neither Kipp Nor Lilley Will Be Placed on Ballot As Nominees of Lincoln Party

Kipp were nominated as candidates for congress by the Lincoln Republicans of this district. This decision will act as a bar to either name appearing on the official ballot as nominees of that party. Both candidates, however, have filed nomination papers, and the same court will decide on Saturday next, which, if either, is entitled to have his name on the ballot as candidate of the Lincoln party. It is the opinion of lawyers who are familiar with decisions in similar cases that the Lincoln party will not have a candidate for congress in the Fourteenth district.
