CAPITOL STEAL HIT HOSPITALS

Gigantic Graft Game Cost the
Packer Hospital at Sayre \$2000

Governor Pennypacker sees things differently at times. After the last regular session of the legislature he vetoed a number of appropriations made to charitable institutions, and others he cut considerably. Here is the memorandum he filed with each veto. "I withhold my approval from these bills for the reason that the state revenue does not justify the appropriations at this time." The appropriation for the Packer hospital at Sayre was out to the extent of \$2,000 by the governor's veto, but at the same time \$9,000,000 of the people's money was being squandered on the state capitol at Harrisburg. Outrageous sums were being paid for capisulders and other equipment, while suffering humanity was meekly knocking at the door of the legislature and begging a crumb. The state capitol steal will go down in history as the most gigantic graft game that has ever been perpetrated on the American public. A rotten Republican machine, headed by a gang who serve the state for spoils only, is responsible for this monumental swindle.

Mial E. Lilley is part and parcel of this unqualified support, and the people of this congressional district are being asked to send him back to Washington, simply because he is a member of the gang. In order to pull the wool over the eyes of the voters, however, Mial and his henchmen are shouting "Roosevelt must be supported!" Roosevelt does not need or want the support of the disreputable gang whose pathway is strewn with public plunder and palpable dishonesty. The defeat of Mial E. Lilley in this district will be a staggering blow to the corruptionist; his defeat will be to the everlasting credit of this congressional district.
