INJUNCTION SERVED ON W.S. & A. PRESIDENT

G. Tracy Rogers Was in Waverly Yesterday and Talked Over the Situation

Waverly—G. Tracy Rogers, the street car man from Binghamton and president of the company that tried to force a line over a Waverly street shortly before midnight last Friday, came to Waverly last night, and he brought his supply of volubility with him. He was met shortly after he got off the train by Attorney E. D. Schring, who handed him a copy of the injunction order. He received it graciously and said that he had come down on purpose to get a copy of the order, and wanted to know if he was not entitled to thanks for the consideration he had shown the process servers. He placed the copy in his pocket, and when asked if he was not going to read it he said, "No," that he paid other people to read things for him.

While here he announced that he had two schemes that he would carry out that would make a decided change in the village. He said that he was going to move the business section up to the west end of Broad and Chemung streets. He also said that he was going to erect car barns in that vicinity and that the waiting room would be moved to that part of the line. When asked if he didn't want the city park for that purpose he replied that he might, but couldn't tell because he had not seen it yet.
