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CYCLONE'S RAGE. Havana Visited by Worst Storm in Years.

CRUISER BROOKLYN ASHORE. American Camps in Suburbs Wrecked by Hurricane.

CUBA LONG CUT OFF FROM WORLD. Our Warships in Harbor Rode Out Storm, but in Great Peril When Anchors Dragged—Many Coasting Vessels Driven High Up On Rocks.

HAVANA, Oct. 20.—As a result of the worst cyclone that Havana has experienced since 1894 and that shut off Cuba from the rest of the world for more than thirty-six hours, sixteen persons are known to have lost their lives, scores were injured and great damage caused to property.

MARRY FASLICK, an army teamster, with the Twenty-eighth infantry, from Sioux City, Ia., sustained probably fatal injuries. He was crushed by a tree which fell through the barracks in which he was sleeping.

One hundred and fifty tobacco barns in the Alguazil district have been destroyed. The recently planted tobacco crop also has been seriously damaged.

The cruisers Denver and Minneapolis, the battleship Texas, the auxiliary cruiser Erie and the supply ship Celtic all dragged their anchors more or less, but prompt seamanship averted collisions.

Eight persons were killed and four were injured by the collapse of a tenement house on Inquisidor street. The other fatalities resulted from falling signs and cornices, contact with live wires in the city or by drowning in the harbor.

The street car service in Havana has been partly resumed, but the bowlders that were washed across the track of the suburban line along the sea front have not yet been removed.

STANDARD IS GUILTY. After Singing Hymns Findlay Jury Agree on Verdict. ROCKEFELLER'S TRIAL TO FOLLOW. Ohio's Suit Against Oil Combination Ends in Defeat of Great Trust.

FINDLAY, O., Oct. 20.—After singing religious songs for a period of two hours early in the morning in the courtroom here the jury in the case of the state of Ohio against the Standard Oil company returned a verdict of guilty on the charge of conspiracy to restrain trade in violation of the anti-trust laws of the state.

Then came a knock at the door, and the jury announced that they were ready to give their verdict. The bailiff summoned Judge Banker, County Prosecutor David and Attorney Troup for the defense.

One Hundred Houses Wrecked. FORT PIERCE, Fla., Oct. 20.—A conductor who has arrived here from Miami reports that 100 houses at Miami were wrecked by the storm.

Funston Goes to San Francisco. WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—General Funston has left Washington for San Francisco to turn over the command of the department of California to Brigadier General John J. Pershing.

Decision Reserved in Crapsey Case. NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Decision was reserved on a motion to dismiss the appeal of Rev. Dr. A. S. Crapsey, rector of St. Andrew's church, Rochester, convicted of heresy, when the appeal came up for a hearing before the Episcopal court of review, which sat at the diocesan house here.

Score Burned to Death. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 20.—The boarding house of Mrs. E. E. Moody was burned at an early hour, and nearly a score of lives are reported lost.

Dusseldorf Painting Cut From Frame. CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 20.—A valuable Dusseldorf painting of fifty years ago was recently stolen from the Cincinnati Art museum, discovery of the theft only being made yesterday.

Carthagenian Ashore. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20.—The steamer Carthagenian of the Allan line, from Liverpool for Philadelphia, is ashore in Delaware bay about seventy miles below this city.

Ex-Confederate Congressman Gone. DALTON, Ga., Oct. 20.—Colonel W. H. Tibbs, one of the few remaining members of the Confederate congress, died at his home here at the age of sixty-two.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The investigation will be continued and the charges made by the leader of Tammany sifted to the bottom.
