CYCLONE'S RAGE. Havana Visited by Worst Storm in Years.

CRUISER BROOKLYN ASHORE. American Camps in Suburbs Wrecked by Hurricane.

CUBA LONG CUT OFF FROM WORLD. Our Warships in Harbor Rode Out Storm, but in Great Peril When Anchors Dragged—Many Coasting Vessels Driven High Up On Rocks.

HAVANA, Oct. 20.—As a result of the worst cyclone that Havana has experienced since 1894 and that shut off Cuba from the rest of the world for more than thirty-six hours, sixteen persons are known to have lost their lives, scores were injured and great damage caused to property.

MARRY FASLICK, an army teamster, with the Twenty-eighth infantry, from Sioux City, Ia., sustained probably fatal injuries. He was crushed by a tree which fell through the barracks in which he was sleeping.

The cruisers Denver and Minneapolis, the battleship Texas, the auxiliary cruiser Erie and the supply ship Celtic all dragged their anchors more or less, but prompt seamanship averted collisions. These ships were all made fast to permanently anchored buoys, which never before were known to have dragged. The damage sustained by the squadron amounts to little. Two boats were lost, and some of the lighter deck fittings were carried away.

Eight persons were killed and four were injured by the collapse of a tenement house on Inquisitor street. The other fatalities resulted from falling signs and cornices, contact with live wires in the city or by drowning in the harbor. The great unoccupied brick building covering the old United railroad wharf, near Regla, was totally demolished.

STANDARD IS GUILTY. After Singing Hymns Findlay Jury Agree on Verdict.

ROCKEFELLER'S TRIAL TO FOLLOW. Ohio's Suit Against Oil Combination Ends in Defeat of Great Trust.

FINDLAY, O., Oct. 20.—After singing religious songs for a period of two hours early in the morning in the courtroom here the jury in the case of the state of Ohio against the Standard Oil company returned a verdict of guilty on the charge of conspiracy to restrain trade in violation of the anti-trust laws of the state.

It was due to the falling of houses that so many fatalities occurred. The occupants who had sought shelter from the rain and wind were caught in the debris, and many of them died before they could be rescued. It was almost impossible for anybody to venture out to the relief, and little was done in the rescue line until morning.

Oil Union to Fight Standard. BREMEN, Oct. 20.—The European Petroleum union, which has been organized here to fight the Standard Oil company, has an initial capital of \$5,000,000. It is backed by the Rothschild company and Nobel Bros, both Russian concerns; the Deutscher bank and other petroleum interests.

HUGHES ON LINCOLN. Republican Candidate Chaired in Oneonta Opera House.

STEAMER ST. LUCIE LOST. Twenty-eight Dead—Fishing Fleet Reported Missing.

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 20.—The steamer St. Lucie, Captain Bravo commanding, has sunk off Florida coast. A steamer has arrived here bringing sixty wounded, and it is said there are twenty-eight dead bodies which will be brought up today.

One Hundred Houses Wrecked. FORT PIERCE, Fla., Oct. 20.—A conductor who has arrived here from Miami reports that 100 houses at Miami were wrecked by the storm. The Episcopal church and the Methodist Episcopal church were blown down. The concrete jail is leaning. The roof was blown off the P. and O. warehouse. The car shed was blown down.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The advancing season has broadened retail trade in staple lines, notably heavyweight clothing and footwear, while wholesale and jobbing departments make satisfactory returns, and there is definite improvement in the promptness with which mercantile collections are made.

Yale Man Beaten by Harvard Golfer. GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Oct. 20.—In the intercollegiate golf championship tournament here Robert Abbott of Yale, last year's champion, was beaten by W. E. Clow, Jr., another New Haven collegian, after a hard match, the champion being one down after nineteen holes had been played.

Red Bank Pastor Missing. RED BANK, N. J., Oct. 20.—The Rev. George C. Pooton, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Navesink, is missing, and his wife is greatly distressed over his mysterious disappearance.

Decision Reserved in Crapsy Case. NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Decision was reserved on a motion to dismiss the appeal of Rev. Dr. A. S. Crapsy, rector of St. Andrew's church, Rochester, convicted of heresy, when the appeal came up for a hearing before the Episcopal court of review, which sat at the diocesan house here. It was agreed to withhold decision until the case had been heard in full.

Score Burned to Death. BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 20.—The boarding house of Mrs. E. E. Moody was burned at an early hour, and nearly a score of lives are reported lost. The house was a ten room lodging, used chiefly by street car conductors and motormen. Few in it got out alive.

Submarine Full of Water. PARIS, Oct. 20.—A dispatch from Brest says that divers declare the sunken submarine boat Lutin to be full of water. One diver who examined the hull of the Lutin said that the hood of her conning tower was open.

Explosion of Ignited Sawdust Fatal. BRUNSWICK, Me., Oct. 20.—An explosion due to the sudden ignition of sawdust in a conveyer at the plant of the Pelepecot Paper mill at Pelepecot, about ten miles from here, caused the death of Samuel Poltras, aged twenty-four, and severely injured three other men employed in the mill.

Ex-Confederate Congressman Gone. DALTON, Ga., Oct. 20.—Colonel W. H. Tibbs, one of the few remaining members of the Confederate congress, died at his home here at the age of sixty-two.

Republican Candidate Chaired in Oneonta Opera House. ONEONTA, N. Y., Oct. 20.—The opera house was crowded last night, and when Mr. Hughes appeared he was loudly cheered. He said in part: "My opponent said last night, I believe it was, or, at any rate, very recently, that if Abraham Lincoln were here today he would be with us in this movement against the menace of power and wealth in politics by our arrogant corporation autocracy, even as he stood against the arrogant slave holding autocracy of his day."

Secretary Shaw confined himself chiefly to national issues, but referred to the question of a candidate's personality, which, he said, was a factor that must sometimes enter into a campaign.
