Catholic—Only the 8 o'clock a. m. mass. Sunday school at 2:30 p. m.

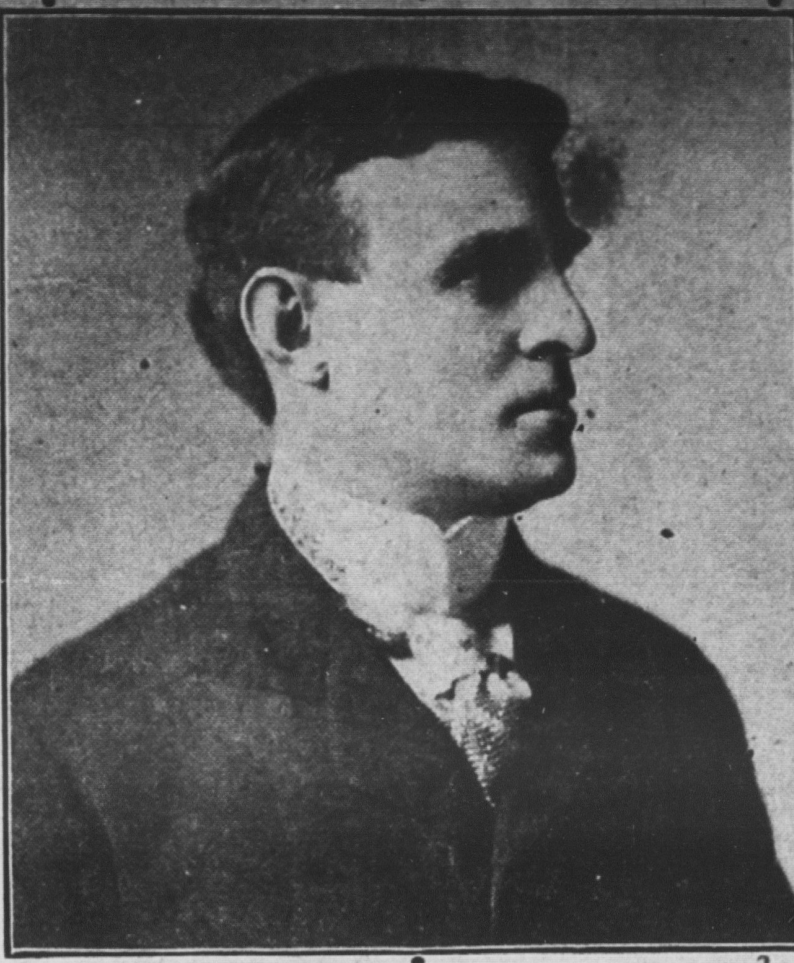
Presbyterian—The usual services by the pastor morning and evening by the pastor. Morning subject, "The True Knight;" evening, "He Hath Appointed a Day."
