WAVERLY LIFELONG RESIDENT DIED SUNDAY MORNING

William Siney Passes Away After a Long Illness at His Home on Waverly Street

Waverly—William H. Siney, a lifelong and highly respected resident, passed away at 3 o'clock last Sunday morning at his home on Waverly street. He was born in Waverly, and this village had always been his home. He was 62 years of age, and had been ill for a long time previous to his death. When the Erie railroad first passed through this place he entered its employ and was actively engaged in railroad work from that time until ill health forced him to retire from his active duties.

He acted as yardmaster at Waverly for the greater part of the time that he was engaged in the work, but a few years ago he was transferred to Binghamton where he worked until he terminated his employment.

He is survived by one brother, Charles H. Siney of Goshen, N. Y., and one sister, Mrs. D. M. Cain of Waverly. He was a charter member of the Binghamton Council, No. 206, Knights of Columbus. That council will be represented at the funeral by a committee, and the Waverly council will attend in a body. He was at one time chief of the Waverly department, and the present chief of the department. James Clohessy requests that all former fire chiefs meet at the city hall at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning for the purpose of attending the funeral.

The funeral will be held next Tuesday morning. At the house at 9 and from St. James church at 9:30 o'clock. The remains will be buried at the St. James Catholic cemetery. It is requested that the friends omit sending flowers.
