TRUSTEES SETTLE TECHNICAL POINT

Waverly—The board of trustees held a meeting at the town hall last evening. The traction company is putting in a switch on upper Broad street. Their franchise permits them to lay switches 150 feet long, and it seems there was some question as to just how the switch should be measured to determine its length. The trustees passed a resolution interpreting the clause: "That such switch or turnout be measured from what is known as the second frog or point of crossing of the inside rails at one end of the switch or turnout to the same point at the other end." It was also decided to place an electric light on Johnson street between Broad and Chemung streets, and one at the corner of Fulton and Erie streets.

INCREASE POLICE FORCE

THE ROLL OF HONOR

Every County Working Hard to Give an Emery Majority.

A study of the vote for State Treasurer in 1905 is interesting in view of the momentous consequences that hang upon the result of next Tuesday's election. From the table printed below it will be seen that Berry carried 51 counties with a majority of 137,283, while Plummer, the gang legislator, rewarded with a nomination by Penrose for his share in the iniquities of the last regular session of the legislature, could count up only 16, with majorities of 49,203. Of this small number nearly 60 per cent, or 28,804, came up from the single county of Allegheny (Pittsburg and Allegheny cities).

From the standpoint of the independent voter the western part of the state made the poorest showing for reform. No less than 10 of its counties, Allegheny, Armstrong, Cameron, Crawford, Fayette, Forest, Indiana, Somerset, Washington and Westmoreland, giving majorities for Plummer, while the eastern and central parts of the state split even, with only three counties each on the machine side. These were Delaware, Susquehanna and Lancaster in the east, and Perry, Snyder and Union along the Susquehanna river. Of the 16 counties that voted for Plummer, five, Cameron, Crawford, Delaware, Forest and Perry, gave majorities of less than 100, and two, Armstrong and Union, majorities of less than 200.

There is every reason to believe that Western Pennsylvania will make a much better showing this year than last. Especially notable will be the change in Allegheny county. With Plummer in the hands of an honest and high-minded mayor and its past fraudulent vote cut down by the personal registration act, that county may be expected to swing into the reform column, just as Philadelphia did last year, when the 60,000 fraudulent votes upon which the gang had been banking so long were eliminated and the people had a chance to give an honest expression of their views. Senator Emery's great personal popularity may be expected to carry along Cameron, Crawford and Forest counties, which lie so near his home, and the splendid fights being made by General Koontz in Somerset and the fusion candidates in other southwestern counties are cutting the gang majorities there to pieces.

Some of the majorities that will be given to Emery next Tuesday in the eastern counties will prove staggering blows to the Penrose machine. Especially popular with the anthracite miners is the fusion candidate, who in his legislative career was always a warm supporter of all measures looking to an improvement in their conditions. If Schuylkill county gives him less than 10,000 majority, as against 5717 for Berry last year, the fusion forces in that county will be disappointed and the five other counties of the anthracite region, Carbon, Columbia, Lackawanna, Luzerne and Northumberland, will largely increase the splendid majorities they gave last year.

The northern and the southern tiers of counties are alike aflame with revolt against the Penrose machine, and from every quarter comes reports of increased majorities for the reform cause. What a splendid showing it would be for the independence and the manliness of the voters of Pennsylvania if every county should cast its vote against the odious gang of freebooters and robbers who have so long fattened on the money of the taxpayers. While that is perhaps too much to hope for Plummer's roll of 16 counties should be cut down to not more than six.

CREASY OR YOUNG?

Capitol Commission Solicitor Or Tribune of the People?

Clean-cut as is the issue between Lewis Emery, Jr., the life-long foe of bossism, and Edwin S. Stuart, the easy-going, weak-kneed figurehead of the Penrose Machine, it is no less sharp and distinct between William T. Creasy, the fusion candidate for auditor general, and Robert K. Young, the gang nominee for the same office.

Do the voters of the state thoroughly appreciate the fact that Mr. Young, who has posed as a man of independence and whose nomination was supposed to be a sop to independently inclined Republicans, is the solicitor of the Capitol Commission and that all the wicked waste of the taxpayers' money on the new capitol has been done with his knowledge and approval? Surely a man who can endorse the expenditure of more than \$12,000,000 on this monumental job is a worthy gang candidate to pass upon the expense of the state government. The Machine can be sure with him that everything will go and that there will be no critical eye fixed upon the easy expenditure of the people's money.

Of a very different type is Mr. Creasy, whose long experience in the legislature has made him peculiarly well acquainted with the problems of state finance and who is probably the one man in Pennsylvania best fitted for the position of auditor general. For years he has been known as an enemy of extravagance and an advocate of state reforms, and it is certain that under his administration no job will slip through without detection and exposure.

Next to the governorship the office of auditor general is in many respects the most important in the state, as its occupant is brought into close relations with the great corporations that contribute to the maintenance of the state government, and it is of the utmost importance, both for the protection of the state and of the corporations, that it should be filled by a man of the highest character. It lies with the taxpayers to decide who is the more likely to administer this office wisely, William T. Creasy, the faithful representative and opponent of jobbery, or Robert K. Young, the solicitor of the Capitol Commission, who has given his sanction to the criminal waste of millions of the people's money.

MR. ROOSEVELT AND SENATOR KNOX

Both Want to See the Penrose Machine Hopelessly Beaten.

One of the amusing features of the campaign is the astonishing alacrity with which Senator Knox has dashed into the fight for Stuart. After remaining silent for two months, during which the battle has been fought out before the people and hopelessly lost by the Penrose machine, the junior senator from Pennsylvania shows his intense interest in the fortunes of the senior senator by consenting to preside at a meeting in the closing work and to speak a few perfunctory words for the gang ticket.

It is no secret that President Roosevelt, whose confidence Senator Knox is believed to have, has no regard for Penrose and that nothing would please him better than to see the organized band of public plunderers, who sail under the black flag of the Penrose-Durham-McNichol aggregation, hopelessly beaten and the decent element of Pennsylvania Republicans brought prominently to the front. Certain gang organs have been trying to make it appear that the president is terribly alarmed over the congressional situation in the state and that he is anxious to bring about peace. Such talk may safely be put down as tommyrot. Everybody who knows anything about President Roosevelt knows that he has been a fighter against bossism for 21 years and that if he were a private citizen of Pennsylvania today he would be one of the staunchest supporters of Lewis Emery, Jr.

Let nobody be deceived into thinking that Senator Knox's few words and the visits of Secretary Shaw and Attorney General Moody have the faintest significance as reflecting the views of the national administration. While President Roosevelt's sympathies must, from the very nature of the man, be entirely with the fusion ticket he is keeping strictly neutral. It is safe to say, however, that when the returns come in next Tuesday night, showing the overwhelming defeat of the Penrose machine, nobody outside of Pennsylvania will be better pleased than the president of the United States.

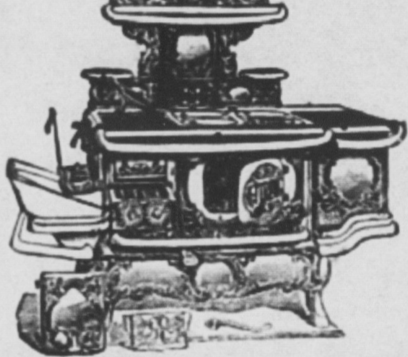
