

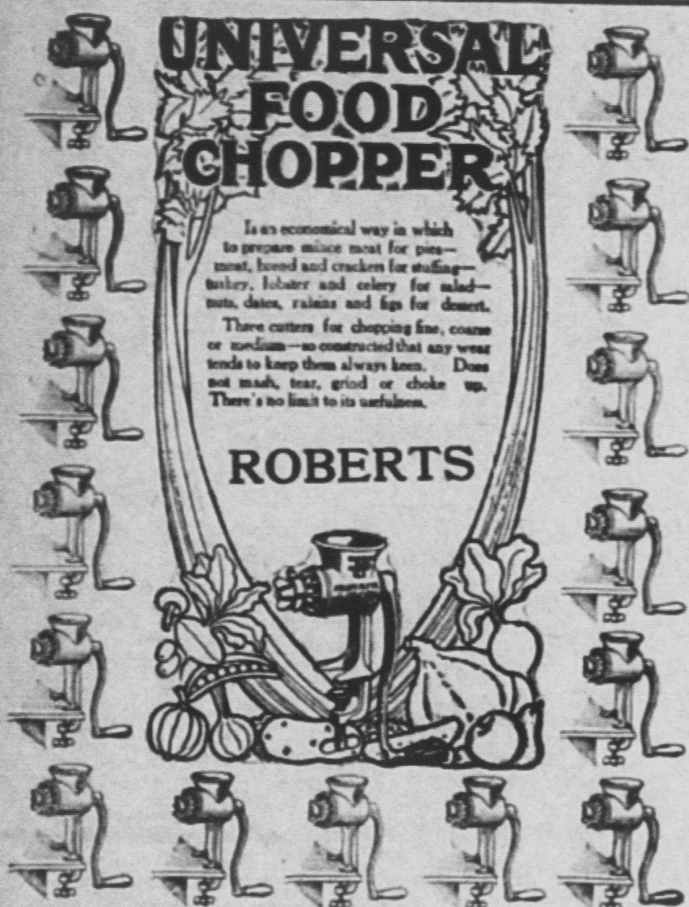

## ELECTION RESULT IS NO LONGER IN DOUBT

Lilley Is on the Run Along With the Rest of the Gang

Election is one week from today and between now and then every voter who is interested in clearing up the political atmosphere and turning the grafters out should work assiduously to that end. There is no longer any doubt of the election of the entire reform ticket. The state ticket is conceded a majority of at least 150,000, and so far as the local fights are concerned all of the machine candidates are shaking at the knees. The fight in the fourteenth congressional district is no longer a contest, but a rout. Lilley is on the run. His most ardent admirers are looking serious and are trying to comfort themselves with the belief that it won't be a landslide. This cheerful aspect, however, should not mislead the voting element and prevent their going to the polls. Notwithstanding the fight is already won it is the duty of every voter who is desirous of seeing a cleaning up in Pennsylvania to go to the polls and register his intentions. Every voter should appoint himself a committee of one to see that every vote in his neighborhood is polled. Reform cannot be accomplished unless those in favor of it go to the polls and cast their ballots. Remaining at home and depending on the other fellow to do the job won't work. Get out and the victory is complete and decisive. Vote for Kipp in this congressional district and thus place yourself on record as being opposed to bossism and crooked political methods.

## ENTERTAINMENT COURSE SECURED

A course of entertainments has been secured to take place at the high school hall at this place. They will be conducted jointly by the Sayre high school alumni association and by the high school athletic association. ## PURCHASING MACHINERY

E. D. Ademy, the well known contractor, returned this morning from Cleveland, O., where he had been to purchase machinery for his gravel pit. He has secured what is known as a stiff arm derrick and a clam shovel bucket, which will be used in loading gravel for the new buildings to be erected by the American LaFrance engine works at Elmira. Mr. Ademy has the contract for furnishing 850 carloads of gravel for these buildings which are to be of concrete. F. H. Johnson of this place has the contract for erecting the buildings and has been engaged at the work for some time.

## PRINTING THE BALLOTS

More than 50,000 ballots and specimen ballots are being printed this week for the use of the voters at the election to be held next Tuesday. ## FELL FROM LADDER SEVERELY INJURED

Painter Employed in Postoffice Building Sustained a Badly Crushed Ankle

T. U. Farnsworth, a painter and decorator who resides on South River street, suffered a severe injury on Saturday evening which will lay him up for several weeks. Mr. Farnsworth has recently been employed in painting the interior of the new postoffice building on Desmond street. Saturday night just before quitting time he was standing on a ladder painting the sidewalk near the ceiling. He reached over too far, and losing his balance fell to the floor, striking on his right foot. ## A SORRY SPECTACLE

In Bradford county there is a normal Republican majority of nearly five thousand, yet the people are now witnessing the spectacle of a Republican candidate for Congress going up and down the county begging for votes. Ordinarily a Republican candidate for this important office, whose political career had not been besmirched with trickery and corrupt practices could sit in the quiet of his home and look the situation in the face with complacency. A candidate who had the confidence of the voters would have no occasion to fear for the future. It would not be necessary for him to even raise his finger. His election would be assured. How different is the situation today. With the nomination for congress secured by tricky Mial Lilley, the present incumbent of the office, is imploring the rank and file to rally to his support. Every artifice that is known to this "astute" politician has been resorted to in order to secure votes. Meetings, with brass band and red fire display have been held in various precincts, and the swish of the party lash sounds in the air. Lilley is in desperate straits. The party which he has dragged into ignominy and disgrace is in open revolt and is on the eve of repudiating him and his methods at the polls on Tuesday next. Lilley has no one to blame but himself. He has worked out his own downfall. The kind of "leadership" that he has employed to advance his own private ends will no longer be tolerated by the members of the party to which he claims to belong. His despairing cry of "elect me and you will stand by Roosevelt" is the cry of a drowning man grasping at straws. Lilley is fully alive to the situation. He has played the game in this county for a long time and it is the last peg on which Lilley can stand, and no one knows it better than himself. The voters, however, are not blind. They know that "standing by Roosevelt" means in this instance standing by Lilley, and they will refuse to be fooled. They will vote the other way this year. They will vote for reform and vote to clean out the gang, to which Lilley has sworn undying allegiance.

## TROLLEY LINE IS NEARLY COMPLETED

Expected That Cars Will Be Running Between Waverly and Elmira by the Holidays

The Erie Railroad company expects to have its trolley line completed in time to run cars for the holidays. The work has progressed rapidly and over certain sections of the route rails have been laid. There are also several sections to grade, but a large force of men is at work and it is expected that the grading over the major portion of the line will be completed before the last of next month. The promoters of the road, however, are experiencing some difficulty in getting the consent of property owners to allow the line to go over their lands this side of Elmira. There are about three miles of the route that has not been touched near the city and the property owners are sticking out for a higher price than the company are willing to pay. It is said that unless the owners come to time the company will begin condemnation proceedings.

## REDUCTION IN FARE

The new schedule of rates in the passenger department of the Lehigh Valley, which will go into effect on November 1, have been received at the various stations along the line, and show a substantial reduction in the fares from Sayre to all points. Heretofore it has cost 51 cents to go from this place to Towanda, but after the new schedule is in force, the fare will be only 45 cents. At the present time a ticket for Towanda and return can be purchased for 85 cents. These tickets are only good for the upper station. Whether the company will make a corresponding reduction in this instance is not known.
