



## LIFE CRUSHED OUT IN SAYRE YARDS

George M. Peters Attempted to Crawl Underneath Train and Met Instant Death.

George M. Peters, a cabinet maker, employed at the Lehigh Valley shops, was killed by the cars in the Sayre yards last night shortly after six o'clock. The unfortunate man met with almost instant death. The left leg was severed at the knee, while the right leg was crushed off between the knee and ankle joint. He was badly bruised about the head and death resulted from shock.

The accident occurred immediately in front of the new power house and was doubtless the result of Mr. Peters' hurry to get to his home. He had been at work in the shops and left with the rest of the men when the whistle blew. When Mr. Peters reached the yards a string of cars blocked the way. He attempted to crawl underneath a freight car, but as he got about half way through a switch engine backed into the string of cars, and before he could get out of harm's way the forward trucks had passed over both legs. The accident was witnessed by several of his shop mates and one of them succeeded in attracting the attention of the engineer who stopped the train. When the train came to a stop the rear trucks had pinned Mr. Peters to the rail.

Another signal was given to the engineer and willing hands lifted the injured man from the rails. He was alive when picked up but only breathed for a few minutes.

One man, whose name could not be learned, fainted when he saw the accident, and had to be assisted from the scene. The body of Mr. Peters was removed to the baggage room at the local station and Justice of the Peace Carey was called to view the remains. He decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

The deceased resided at No. 135 South Hopkins street for the past thirty-five years and was well known among the older citizens of Sayre. He was 71 years of age and was born in Athens, where he lived up to the time of his coming to Sayre. He was a member of the Baptist church and was highly respected by every one who knew him. He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. H. W. Young of No. 328 Chemung street, Sayre; one sister, Mrs. Helen Conklin of Horseheads, N. Y.; and a half brother and half sister, who reside at Athens. The funeral arrangements will be announced later.

## BLACK DIAMOND MET WITH ACCIDENT

Tire on One of the Big Drivers Flew Off at Varrick Last Night.

Engine No. 2452 drawing the westbound Black Diamond met with an accident at the foot of the hill near Varrick last night shortly after six o'clock. The engine was in charge of Engineman Tom Farley, and when the train reached the bottom of the hill the tire on one of the big driving wheels on the left side of the engine flew off. Several spokes in the wheel were smashed and both parallel rods were broken. A piece of iron from the broken wheel struck the gas pipe that connects the gas tank with the cafe car and allowed the gas to escape. A splinter flew from one of the spokes and struck Engineer Farley on the leg inflicting a flesh wound.

A man was sent to Reeders, where the wrecking crew were telegraphed for. A new engine was sent out from Sayre and the crippled one was brought to the shops at this place. The Diamond was delayed about two hours.

### LOCAL NEWS

The piers and abutments for the new Lehigh Valley bridge at Towaunda are completed, the work having been finished on Monday last. There are two abutments and 13 piers. The big cable which carried the material for the job will be taken down next week.

## WHY IS MR. MASON SO INTERESTED?

Did He Visit Sayre in the Interest of Mr. Gompers or in the Interest of Mr. Lilley?

Voters are cautioned to look out for canards and last cards which are about to be sprung by the Lilley cohorts. According to reliable information within the next twenty-four hours Sayre and Athens are to be flooded with a publication, in which will be printed an article telling the residents of this district what a good friend Mial is to the working man and how he has stood by organized labor.

The article, it is said, is the result of a visit which was made to this place recently by a fellow named Mason. The latter is the editor of a labor paper. Mason came here last week Friday, and he was deeply interested in the Gompers letter which was published in The Record, and in which was asserted that Mr. Lilley was unfair to labor. Since Mason's visit here it has been circulated by Lilley's supporters that the signature was not genuine. That while to all intents and purposes it was Mr. Gompers' signature, it has been appended to the letter without the knowledge of Mr. Gompers. Mr. Mason was a quiet sort of a gentleman and had nothing to offer when the letter was shown to him at The Record office. He merely said that it would be investigated. But now the question arises why was Mr. Mason here? Why is Mr. Mason interested in the congressional contest in the Fourteenth district. Did Mr. Mason come here because he is deeply interested in protecting Mr. Gompers' signature from misuse, or did he come at the behest of Lilley, who is using every method known to explain his unfair attitude toward labor. 
