Their "Star" Argument

Dear Sir:—I have not been "invited" to make any "speeches" in this campaign, being too obscure of course for that; however I would like to make a little "speech" in regard to the Congressional situation; and although a total stranger to you; would ask the privilege of making it through your columns, with your reader for an audience.

Let me premise by saying that I have no personal grievance against Congressman Lilley, with whom I

have been acquainted for many years. He has never refused me any favor; for the very good reason that I have never asked for any.

There is Danger in Attempting to Vote a Split Ballot This Year.

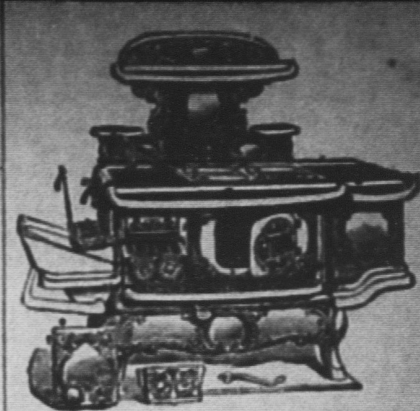
