

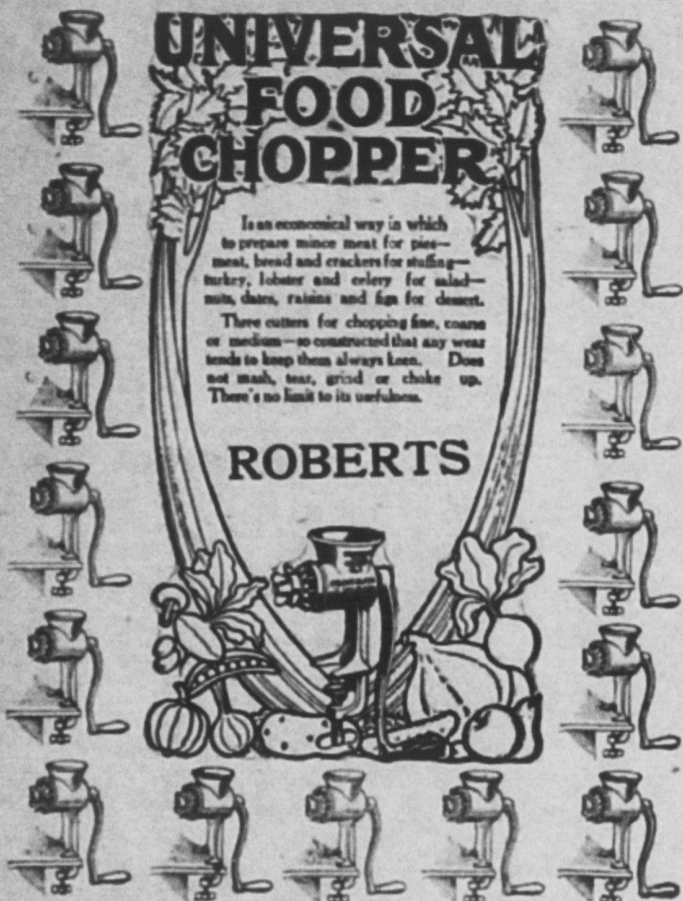

HIGH SCHOOL LECTURE COURSE

An Excellent List Has Been Provided by the Alumni Association

The final arrangements have been made for the entertainment course that will be given at the high school hall under the auspices of the alumni association and the high school athletic association. The course will consist of five entertainments by the best talent appearing before the American public today.

The first number is the Rogers-Griley recital, and will take place Nov. 16. Mr. Rogers is one of the best harpists in the country, and Mr. Griley is one of the most mirth provoking impersonators that ever appeared in this section. Those who have heard him are high in their praise of his work.

The second number is slated for Dec. 15 and consists of an excellent musical company, together with a reader of rare ability, whose imitations of birds, animals and children is truly amazing.

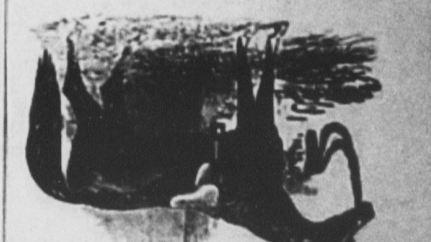
