NOVA SCOTIA GALE Wrecks Strew Coast of Northumberland Strait. HALIFAX REPORTS MANY WRECKS. Damage on Sea and Land in Four Provinces—Norwegian Bark Lost. It is Feared, With Twelve of Her Crew.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 6.—Almost incessantly dispatches have been pouring into this city, bringing news of vessels wrecked or in distress, of wires protruded and of damage done by gale and sea all along the coasts of Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

The station was most violent in Northumberland strait, which separates the southern shore of Prince Edward Island from the northern Nova Scotia coast. Two schooners and one bark were swept around in this strait, and a third schooner was wrecked near the eastern entrance to the strait.

Five Lost When Boat Uproot. RICHIBUCTO, N. B., Nov. 6.—A boat's crew which left the wrecked Norwegian bark Adeona perished by the boat capsizing. It is thought five men were lost.

Berlin, Nov. 6.—At a reception given by Emperor William to the delegates to the international wireless telegraph conference his majesty talked for some time with the American delegates, Rear Admiral Manney and John F. Waterbury of New York. He sent a message to President Roosevelt through Mr. Waterbury.

Funeral of Colonel Cannon. BURLINGTON, Vt., Nov. 6.—The funeral of Colonel Le Grand E. Cannon of New York and this city was held at St. Paul's Episcopal church here. The rector of the church, Rev. George Y. Bliss, conducted the service.

Bank Cashier Defunct. MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 6.—Cashier H. C. Dufosse of the Monroe County bank at Monroeville has been checked short \$22,115 by State Bank Examiner Rutledge. The bank is solvent.

GLEN COVE STAKES. Athletic and Roeben Capture Honors at Aqueduct Track. NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Athlete, backed down from 4 1/2 to 1 to 18 to 5, easily won the Glen Cove staking stakes, one mile and a sixteenth, Aqueduct.

Bloomington, Ind., Nov. 6.—Indiana university football team had little difficulty in defeating DePaul here, 55 to 0. Indiana played a fast game and especially in the first half, when they scored 39 points.

Orphan Lad at Baltimore. BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 6.—With two features on the programme of the Maryland Jockey club's fall meeting and an added race a big crowd saw great sport at Pimlico. The chief feature, the Walden stake, went to Orphan Lad in easy style.

Chose Death Rather Than Jail. BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 6.—In a cheap lodging house on East Baltimore street Dr. J. Baxter Matthews of Greensboro, N. C., blew out his brains with a shot from a revolver. Dr. Matthews was convicted at Greensboro, N. C., of the poisoning of his wife and had been out of custody under bail pending the decision of his appeal for a new trial.

Stensland and Hering Sentenced. CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Paul O. Stensland, formerly president of the failed Milwaukee Avenue State bank, who was arrested in Tangier, and Henry W. Hering, cashier of the same institution, were sentenced by Judge Pinkney in the criminal court to indeterminate terms in the penitentiary for embezzlement and forgery. The sentences may run anywhere from one to ten years.

Feary to Touch First at North Sydney ST. JOHN'S, Nov. 6.—Sir William Macgregor, the governor of the colony, has received a telegram from Commander Robert E. Feary, the Arctic explorer, from Labrador to the effect that he will be unable to accept an invitation to visit him on the birthday of King Edward, Nov. 9, as he plans to return to New York via North Sydney, N. S.

St. Johnsbury, Vt., Nov. 6.—The wedding of Miss Annie Ide, daughter of Henry P. Ide, formerly governor general of the Philippines, to Congressman Bourke Cockran of New York will take place at the St. Regis hotel in New York on Nov. 17, according to statements made by relatives of the Ide family here.

Outrage on Officials at Shanghai. SHANGHAI, Nov. 6.—While the consulate of the German consulate was walking with a Russian friend Sunday evening from Woosung to Shanghai the two men were set upon by natives. Both were seriously maltreated and were almost stripped of their clothing. They managed to escape and hid in a paddy field.

Fire Followed Robbery. AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 6.—Fire of incendiary origin followed the robbery of the safe of Sol Hammett & Co. at Spread, Ga., destroying \$25,000 worth of merchandise. It is known that the safe was locked, and while the fire burned it was seen that the door of the safe was standing open.

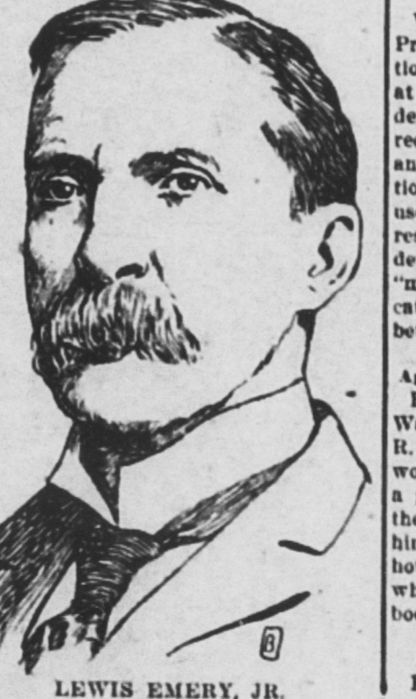

Warrants For 207 at Newark. NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 6.—Warrants were issued here for 207 persons whose names, it is claimed, are illegally on the registration lists in this city. The warrants were placed in the hands of policemen who will be stationed at the various polling places today.

IN METEOR SHOWER Steamer St. Andrew In Dire Peril at Sea. HUGE MASSES OF METAL RAIN DOWN "Had Falling Stars Happened to Have Hit the Vessel," Said Captain Fitzgerald, "Every Soul Would Have Been Destroyed."

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—When the Phenix line steamship St. Andrew arrived from Antwerp Captain Fitzgerald reported that the steamer had passed through a meteoric shower at 4:30 o'clock on Tuesday about 600 miles northwest of Cape Race. The largest meteor observed fell into the sea less than a mile away. Had it struck the St. Andrew all hands would have perished.

Red Men Win Land From Whites. WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The supreme court of the United States affirmed the decision of the court of claims in the case of Daniel Red Bird, the Cherokee Nation and others versus the United States, known as "the white man's case." The cases involved the long pending claims of 2,000 and 3,000 white persons to participate in the distribution of the lands and the funds of the Cherokee Nation because of marriages with members of the tribe.

Denounce Roosevelt Spelling. WASHINGTON, Pa., Nov. 6.—The Principals Round Table, an organization of Washington county educators, at a meeting here adopted resolutions denouncing the new phonetic spelling recommended by President Roosevelt and urged the various boards of education or school directors to prohibit its use in the schools of the county. The resolution also protested to the state department of education against the "monstrous conditions that exist educationally in Pennsylvania" and urged better supervision of school athletics.

Apparently Revived, Dropped Dead. BRISTOL, Conn., Nov. 6.—James N. Watson, aged forty, of Pawtucket, R. I., an employee of the Bristol gas works, was asphyxiated while tapping a gas main here, being overcome by the escaping gas. Companions dragged him out and walked him about for an hour and had apparently revived him when suddenly he dropped dead. The body will be sent to Pawtucket.

Beat Boss to Death With Clubs. BARBOURSVILLE, W. Va., Nov. 6.—At Stone Branch, twenty miles south of here, G. W. Wright and Andrew Childers, mine boss, became enraged at John Kelley, another boss, assaulted him with clubs and beat him into insensibility. Kelley died thirty minutes later. Wright and Childers secured mules and escaped, but were later captured and jailed.

Governor Sparks Ill From Overwork. RENO, Nev., Nov. 6.—On the eve of election Governor John Sparks, the Democratic silver party nominee for re-election, is threatened with pneumonia. Two doctors and nurses are in constant attendance over him. His illness is the result, it is believed, of the hard work of the campaign.
