COUNTY OF TIOGA RE-ELECTS WINTERS

Carries Seven Out of the Nine Towns in the County.

Waverly—The hardest, and in fact the only contest in Tioga county yesterday was for the office of assemblyman. The fight was between Byram L. Winters, the regular Republican candidate, and Fred J. Davis, the Democratic candidate.

In spite of the hot fight, however, Mr. Winters carried seven out of the nine towns, although the majorities from some were small.

TIOGA COUNTY GIVES HUGHES 1000

Waverly—So far as the returns from the various districts in Tioga county have been obtained it seems that Hughes has received a majority of about 1000. The vote in the Town of Barton with the Lockwood district still to be heard from gives Hughes 840 and Hearst 518, a majority of 322.

PRESS BULLETINS DRAW LARGE CROWD

Waverly—With the enterprise characteristic of him Roy Waid, the Waverly correspondent of the Binghamton Press, installed a stereopticon in his office, and threw the election returns upon a canvas stretched against the building on the opposite side of the street.

FIRE DESTROYED DWELLING HOUSE

Building Was Burned to the Ground, Flames Originated from Spark from Passing Engine.

This afternoon a house situated near the cove occupied by John Balcom caught fire presumably from a spark from a passing engine and was burned to the ground. The house is situated outside the borough limits, but the fire alarm was blown and the fireman made an effort to save the building.

THE PEOPLE'S VICTORY

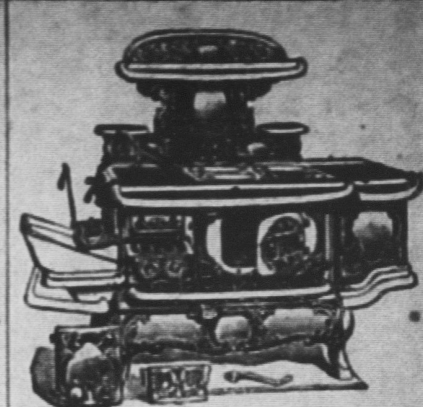
