



## SAYRE BOROUGH RESPONDS NOBLY

Emery, Kipp and the Rest of the Reform Ticket Given a Handsome Majority

Sayre borough responded nobly for the cause of Emery and reform. With the exception of the third ward every ward in the borough gave Emery and the reform ticket a handsome majority. In the third ward Stuart won out by a small majority. For congress Sayre borough fulfilled expectations and has given George W. Kipp, the Democratic Independent nominee for congress, a fine majority. Normally Sayre is a Republican borough, but the Republicans voted with the Democrats and the Emery and Kipp tickets were both sustained by big majorities. The second ward, under the master leadership of E. J. Connelly, gave the biggest majority of any of the wards in the borough; Lilley, the Republican candidate, being beaten two to one.

The election in this borough passed off quietly. Notwithstanding that the contest was a heated one, there was no disturbance of any kind, except now and then a clash of tongues. All the wards were filled with workers and every hack and single rig in the town was pressed into service in order to get the voters to the polls. The vote polled is not as large as was expected, many preferring to remain at home.

The Socialist organization polled a considerable number of votes and is showing an appreciable gain in strength.

Moscrip and Stevens, neither of whom was opposed, will go to the assembly, while Scott, the Republican candidate for jury commissioner, and Graham, the Democratic nominee, received large votes. The vote by wards:

## GEORGE W. KIPP WINS CONGRESSIONAL CONTEST

Carries the District by a Majority Estimated at Two Hundred

George W. Kipp, the Democratic nominee for Congress in this congressional district, is elected by a majority that will probably reach

300. Mr. Kipp has carried his own county [Bradford] by nearly 900 majority, while the Republican majorities in the other counties have been reduced enough to positively insure his election.

The election of Mr. Kipp was conceded last night at 12 o'clock, but friends of Mr. Lilley, the Re-

publican candidate, are loath to give up the fight even yet, and are depending upon a few remote districts, that have not yet been heard from, to save their candidate from defeat. The returns thus far, however, show that Mr. Kipp has won out, after one of the hardest political fights that the district has seen in years.

The fourteenth congressional district is normally Republican by about 5,000 majority, and when this is taken into consideration it will at once be seen that Mr. Kipp has been contending against odds. It will be impossible to give the official figures of the result before tomorrow, as there are

## STUART WINS BY SMALL MAJORITY

Reformers Say, However, That Belated Returns May Change Result

The result in the state is in doubt. When The Record went to press the returns indicated that Stuart, the Republican candidate for governor, is elected by a small majority. The Emery reformers, however, claim that the majority may be overcome by belated returns.

## WAVERLY WINS AT FOOTBALL

In a football game marred by frequent jangles, delays and fistic encounters, the Pastime football team, Waverly, defeated the Orioles by a score of 11 to 6. There was much good football material in both teams, and the game was good while it was going, but there was so much delay that many left the field during its progress. Sayre started off with a rush, and after two scrimmages the full back broke through and ran over 50 yards for a touchdown. Waverly then scored a touchdown on rushes through and just outside of tackle. In the second half both sides gained considerable ground. Near the end of the game one of the Waverly half backs secured the ball on a blocked kick and ran nearly the length of the field for a touchdown.

## CHOIR INSTALLATION

A beautiful and impressive service will be held in the Church of the Redeemer, Sayre, this evening Wednesday at eight o'clock.

The church's two choirs will be formally set apart by the Rector, assisted by the Rev. Francis Yarrow, Hazleton, Pa., the Rev. Wm. E. Daw, of Athens and the Rev. H. W. Cryden of Waverly.

The children's choir consisting of twentyfour voices will be installed first. These children range in age from seven to fourteen; it is a mixed choir of boys and girls. They lead the singing in Sunday School, the Friday night services, and assist the regular choir on special occasion. The have their own special vestments and only one other choir is similar to this in the United States, that one being at Grace church, where no less than six choirs are constantly trained for the services of that great institution.

The regular church choir will follow the children's choir and consists of thirty voices under the leadership of John M. Jolls. Mr. Jolls by experience and knowledge is well equipped as a choir leader. He directs the well known "Wanamaker" choir numbering over four hundred voices. Mr. Jolls also is leader of several successful Oratoria Societies. After the installation of both choirs a choral service will be rendered by the joint choirs.

Preceding the choral service will be the processional hymn; this will be followed by an address by the Rector, setting forth the nature of the choir office, the duties involved in it, and the dangers attendant thereon. All seats in the Church of the Redeemer are free and since this is a rare and unique as well as impressive service the public is cordially invited.

## FATALLY INJURED

Vincenzo Caruso, an Italian residing near Lockwood, attempted to cross the track in front of and was struck by an engine. He became entangled in the machine in some manner and dragged a distance of nearly half a mile before the engine was stopped.
