New York State Vote For Second Place Very Close.

CHANLER LEADS IN CITY BY 134,941

Governor Elect Hughes, Leaving For Adirondacks, Says Victory Is For Sobriety and For Decency in Government.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Incomplete returns from more than two-thirds of the counties in the state of New York make it impossible to give definite figures on the state ticket other than for governor, Charles E. Hughes, Republican candidate for governor, has a majority of 52,000 approximately, but the remainder of the candidates are in doubt.

For lieutenant governor Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler, Democratic-Independent league candidate, has a lead in the city of Greater New York of 134,941. Up state as to the subordinate candidates for lieutenant governor, is running slightly ahead of Mr. Hughes' vote.

Mr. Hughes left for the Adirondacks last night in company with State Chairman Woodruff, whose guest he is to be at Kamp Kill Kare.

BOY MAYOR WINS.

Rhode Island Goes Democratic, Elects James Higgins For Governor.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 8.—James H. Higgins, the "boy mayor" of Pawtucket (Democrat), defeated Governor George H. Utter (Republican) for reelection by a plurality of 1,238, according to complete returns compiled by the Providence Journal. The rest of the Republican state ticket was elected.

All of the towns heard from have sent solid Republican delegations to the general assembly, blighting the hopes of the Democratic-Lincoln party nominees, Colonel R. H. J. Goddard, candidate for the United States senate to succeed George Penbody Wetmore.

Democratic mayors are elected in Woonsocket and Providence.

BEEF TRUST MAN BEATEN.

Wadsworth Defeated by Peter A. Porter of Niagara Falls.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Nov. 8.—James A. Wadsworth, who for many years has been regularly re-elected to congress from the Thirty-fourth district, was defeated by Peter A. Porter of this city. The issue upon which Porter made his fight was Wadsworth's stand at the last session for the beef trust.

COLONIAL ELECTIONS.

Porto Rico Contest Results in Victory For Insular Party.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Nov. 8.—The Insular party scored an overwhelming victory at the polls here, carrying all the seven districts of the island.

The Republicans are left without representation in the next house of delegates. In the last election the Insularists carried five districts and the Republicans two.

The elections evoked much enthusiasm, but there were no disturbances, and it was the most orderly election since the American occupation.

JOHNSON IN MINNESOTA.

Democratic Candidate For Governor Re-elected by 40,000 Plurality.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 8.—Governor John A. Johnson, Democrat, was re-elected governor of Minnesota by at least 40,000 plurality, and the final figures may go considerably higher.

The majorities of the Republican officials elected range from 25,000 to 60,000. Governor Johnson was elected two years ago by a plurality of 7,500, while the state went to Roosevelt by 150,000.

A Landslide in Connecticut. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 8.—The Democratic party was swamped in Connecticut in spite of the vigorous campaign waged on state issues.

Robert S. Murphy for lieutenant governor, Robert K. Young for auditor general and Henry Houck for secretary of internal affairs, the other candidates on the Republican state ticket, were also re-elected by pluralities slightly under that of Stuart.

The unexpected result of the election in Philadelphia was keenly felt by the Reform party. The principal fight in the city was made for the office of district attorney, and it was one of the bitterest in the political history of the county.

California Defeats Hearst Candidate. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Gillette, Republican, for governor, is reported elected by about 10,000 plurality, with Bell, Democrat and Union Labor, second, and Langdon, Independence league, third.

A Personal Triumph For Roosevelt. ROME, Nov. 8.—Commenting upon the outcome of the gubernatorial election in New York state, the local press lays particular stress upon the personal intervention of President Roosevelt.

Close in New Jersey. TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 8.—Revised returns show that the Democrats will have the house of assembly, 31 to 29, and that the Democrats have elected four congressmen in New Jersey, a gain of three.

Roosevelt to Longworth. CINCINNATI, Nov. 8.—Congressman Nicholas Longworth, who was re-elected to congress, has received the following telegram from President Roosevelt:

"Newsboy" For Congressman. BALTIMORE, Nov. 8.—Maryland's delegation in the Sixtieth congress will be three Republicans and three Democrats, proportionately the same as at present, but with a change in two of the districts.

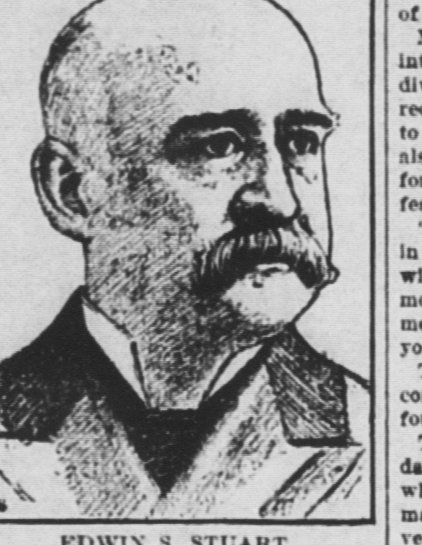

BONI'S MANEUVERS.

Castellane Implores Countess to Take Him Back Again.

WIFE FOUND HIM "DISGUSTING."

Maitre Bonnet Defends the Titled Frenchman, Charging Outside Influence and Bribery of Witnesses in Famous Suit.

PARIS, Nov. 8.—The courtroom in the palace of justice occupied by the tribunal of first instance of the Seine was again crowded to the doors when the hearing of the divorce suit brought by the Countess de Castellane against her husband, Count Boni, was resumed.

Maitre Cruppi of counsel for the countess, in resuming the presentation of the case which he had covered last week, referring to the reckless fashion in which the count had spent millions of the countess' money.

Maitre Cruppi then plunged directly into the countess' maneuvers since the divorce proceedings were instituted to reconquer his wife's affections, writing to the countess letters filled with avowals of sincere repentance, supplications for pardon, passionate words and professions of undying love.

"You have been my life," he declared in one of his letters. "Your absence will be my death. Take me back once more. I will live only for you. Let me embrace you and once more feel you in my arms," and so on.

The countess' tone changed. The next day he sent the countess a letter in which he upbraided her for being "a mad woman actuated by hate and vengeance" and saying that their children would some day reproach her for her "spitefulness."

But the count soon resumed writing love letters to the countess, begging her to allow to see her and predicting that he would soon die. The letters continued until the middle of September, when the count wrote that he would not long survive, pleading to see the countess and saying:

"If I am in danger, come. Do not let me die alone, like an abandoned dog." The feature of Maitre Bonnet's presentation of the count's side of the case was the charge that the countess' lawyers had poisoned her mind.

Maitre Bonnet's charge of the bribery of witnesses may prove successful in forcing an inquiry, as a French court seldom overlooks such allegations.

As many of 150 documents in the creditors' case have been served, which will be heard immediately after the divorce case is disposed of.

Mourned Only For Dead Pet. NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Burglars broke into Jacob Heinrich's Grand Central Tunnel hotel on Third avenue, smashed the safe, chloroformed a pet dog and stole \$1,000, most of which was election tins.

"Barley King" O'Neill Dead. WINONA, Minn., Nov. 8.—Word was received here from Cameron, Mo., of the death of H. J. O'Neill, a former millionaire of this city. At one time he owned all the grain elevators in southern Minnesota and bought most of the barley raised in this section.

Governor Magoon Guest of Honor. HAVANA, Nov. 8.—Governor Magoon was the guest of honor at a reception given last night by the Havana Post. Many Americans and prominent Cubans were present.

Witte Sentenced to Death. MOSCOW, Nov. 8.—A report was in circulation here that the League to Combat the Revolution, to which the murder of Deputy Herzstein in Finland last summer has been ascribed, had sentenced the former premier, Count Witte, to death in case he returns to Russia.

Steamer Abandoned as Total Loss. CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Nov. 8.—The steamer Turret Belle, stranded at Cable head, was surveyed and condemned as a total loss. She is insured for \$70,000, and the owners have abandoned her to the underwriters.

COLLISION AT HELL GATE.

Fall River Steamer Maine Rammed and Had to Be Beached.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—While passing through Hell Gate on her way to her pier the Fall River line steambot Maine was rammed by a tug of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

The tug struck the Maine on the port side amidships, staying in the side for twenty feet and smashing the railing and deck.

The force of the collision threw most of the crew of the Maine from their feet. Fortunately she carried no passengers. Captain Hazard blew shrill blasts from his whistle, which attracted some tugboats, but before they could give any assistance Captain Hazard swung his wheel around and beached the vessel on the sandy shore of East River park.

Employees of the American Ice company at East Ninety-first street put out in small boats, fearing the vessel would fill up and sink before she was beached.

The sisters and inmates of the House of the Good Shepherd, which is on the river front between Eighty-ninth and Ninetieth streets, rushed to the windows, and some little commotion was caused.

When the sisters saw that the vessel was safely beached, however, they quieted the inmates.

When Captain Hazard beached the steamer he ran her on a submerged rock, and she went bow high out of the water. Under the stern at this point the water is 110 feet deep.

JACOBITE AT AQUEDUCT.

Sport Warred by Fall of Hennessy and Death of Dr. Dix.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Jockey J. Hennessy had a narrow escape from death when his mount, Dr. Dix, fell in the fifth race at Aqueduct. Hennessy was thrown heavily, knocked senseless and was removed to the emergency hospital in the paddock, where he was revived. He was not hurt. Dr. Dix broke his neck in the fall.

He was backed down from 50 to 1 to 10 to 1 at the close. Hennessy got off in fairly good position, but before the field had gone a sixteenth of a mile there was considerable crowding, and Dr. Dix fell. Meanwhile Miller, on the favorite, Aster D'Or, worked his way through and won by two lengths. Supreme was so badly hurt by Dr. Dix falling against him that he had to be shot after being pulled up by Sewell. Jacobite, the 9 to 10 favorite, scored an easy victory in the Woodmere selling stakes.
