

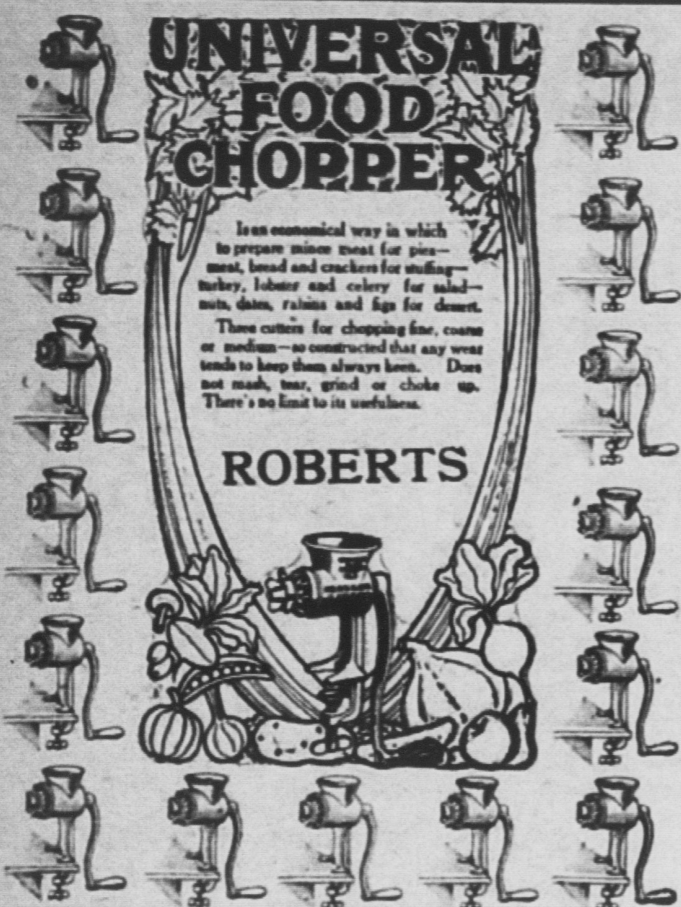

## SHIRT FACTORY TO BE LOCATED HERE

Levinton Bros. Have Rented Lower Floor of Talmadge Building for This Purpose

Sayre is to have a new industry in the shape of a shirt factory which will be located in the building now occupied by H. R. Talmadge as a plumbing shop. The lease for the building was drawn yesterday and possession will be given on the first day of next month.

Some time ago Max Levinton, a representative of the Elmira Shirt Manufacturing Company came to Sayre for the purpose of looking over the town. After talking with several business men he concluded that this would be an excellent place in which to locate. Accordingly he entered into an agreement by which the company secures possession of the lower floor and basement of the building mentioned above.

The company have been in business in Elmira for several years but recently the plant at that place has been unable to fill the orders, and it was determined to establish a branch of the industry in some place where operators could be secured. The plant will start with about fifty hands and this number will be increased from time to time. The product will be of a high character, requiring the installing of up to date machinery.

## DURANTE TO BE SENT TO ITALY

Former Employers of Man With Broken Back Will Defray His Expenses to His Native Land

On September 21 last Francisco Durante, an Italian in the employ of S. B. Mutchler & Son at Towanda, was struck by a traveling bucket used in the construction of the piers for the Lehigh's new bridge, and sustained injuries from which the physicians say he will never recover. He was crushed to the earth by the blow from the bucket and when he was brought to the hospital at this place the surgeons discovered that one of the vertebrae in the spinal column had been broken. Despite this fact Durante may live for years. He is paralyzed from the hips down and is therefore practically helpless, although he is able to move the lower part of his body. He appears cheerful and converses cheerfully with his fellow countrymen, to whom he recently expressed a desire to go to his native country and spend his few remaining days. His wish was made known to his former employers, Mutchler & Son, and yesterday arrangements were made whereby Durante will at once be sent to Italy. Mr. Lewis, the bookkeeper for the firm, came to Sayre yesterday afternoon, and with several of Durante's fellow countrymen went to the hospital, where Durante was paid the sum of \$200 in cash and also entered into an agreement releasing the firm from liability on account of the injuries which he has sustained. In addition to the \$200 Durante is to be provided transportation from Sayre to his home at Giania, Italy, and two male nurses will be employed to accompany him. Surgical aid will also be furnished, as Durante is suffering from sores on his back and hips which he has acquired from lying in bed so long. The entire expenses of sending Durante to his home, accompanied by the nurses, will amount to nearly \$1,000, and this will be borne entirely by Mutchler & Son. This action on the part of the firm is most commendatory. From a legal standpoint it is extremely doubtful whether Durante or his heirs could have recovered damages from the firm as the accident is said to have resulted from carelessness other than that contributed by them.

Mutchler & Son are well known in Sayre, having executed a large contract here for the Lehigh when the new shops were built. They acquired an excellent reputation here for square dealing, and their treatment of this unfortunate Italian indicates that the reputation is well merited.

Durante and his attendants will probably start for the sunny land of Italy the latter part of this week. It is said that the \$200 which he received from Mutchler & Son will keep him in comparative comfort in Italy for a period of ten years

## ERIE FIREMEN FAVOR STRIKE

Engineers to Make Demands and If Refused, They, Too, Will Go Out.

The firemen on the Erie railroad favor a strike. The vote thus far is almost unanimous in favor of going out. It is expected that the result will be announced late this evening. As soon as the result is announced it will be made known to the Federated board, which has the final say as to whether or not the men shall cease work.

It is also announced that the engineers are formulating demands which will be made upon the company, and in the event of the demands not being granted the men at the throttle will leave their posts. A strike of both engineers and firemen will result in the complete tying up of the Erie system. The two committees of the firemen and engineers will hold a conference tomorrow.

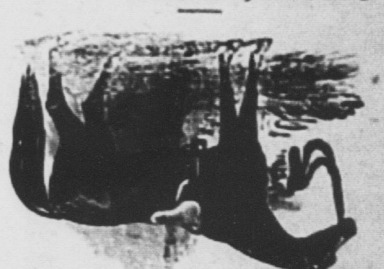
