### VILLAGE TRUSTEES

#### LEVY ASSESSMENT

Some Objections Were Raised But the Village Law Makers Taxed the Proportionate Amounts

Waverly—After several unsuccessful attempts to hold a meeting to make the assessment on the new pavement a quorum of the trustees was present last night and the work completed. There were some objections to the assessments levied against Hall & Lyons and the mattress factory. F. E. Hawkes Esq. appeared for these parties and claimed that the assessment could not be legally levied against them on the ground that the tax was levied on the basis of benefits conferred and that in this case the pavement was a bridge approach and no benefit to the abutting owners. The trustees could not see it that way however and the pro rata amount was levied. The proportion assessed against the abutting owners was 80 per cent.; 40 per cent on each side of the street.
