From Waverly Free Press.  
Dr. Richard B. Ackmore has received his license from the University of the State of New York to practice medicine and surgery in that state. He has moved office from Sayre to rooms in the D. D. Knapp building, Broad street.

Dr. Blackmore is an alumnus of "Boston University School of Medicine," which stands, according to statistics of the American Medical Association, among the few really great medical schools of the country.

Dr. Blackmore now has passed the state medical boards of Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and New York, all at an unusually high rate of scholarship.

His record as a surgeon in Ashburnham, Mass., (his late residence) stands highest of any resident physician ever in that locality. He was a member of the board of health of the town, the medical examiner of the Royal Arcanum and of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, as well as surgeon for the Boston & Maine railroad in that section.

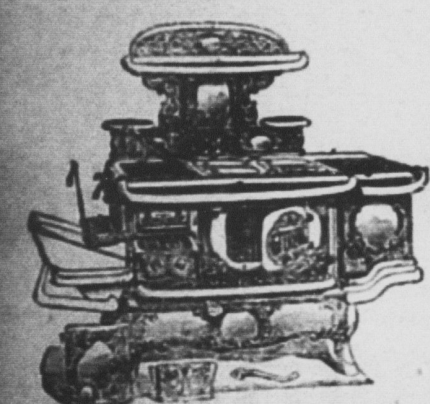

## COMPLETE PROGRAM FOR CELEBRATION

### Fiftieth Anniversary of Waverly Institute to Be Fittingly Commemorated

Waverly—Public exercises in memory of the founding of the old Waverly Institute fifty years ago will be held in the high school building Friday Nov. 23, 1906. A reception beginning at one o'clock and continuing until eleven in the evening will be held in the grammar school study hall. A musical program will be given during the afternoon beginning at three o'clock and in the evening at 7:30 sharp. Prof. Robbins will show in the High School study hall how the old time "deestric school" was conducted prior to the advent of higher education. This will be followed by a roll call and some reminiscences of the Institute. All former students are urged and all others are invited to be present at these exercises. So far as possible the Alumni Association has notified all out of town former students whose addresses can be obtained and also all former teachers, many of whom are expected to be present. The committees in charge hope that no former student either of the Institute or the High School who can attend will fail to register in one of the study halls during the day.

On the following Monday evening Dr. Henry Leiziger of New York City will deliver an address in the Opera House which will also be free to the public.
