**INCREASE IN WAGES BOUND TO COME**

Railroads in the East Must Meet the Advance Recently Made By the Pennsylvania

Following the lead of the Pennsylvania it is said that the other railroad companies especially those in the anthracite region, will give all classes of employes an increase in wages, amounting in the most cases to ten per cent.

The bosses at Wilkes Barre and Sayre, especially those employed in and about the shops, claim that it will have to be done, or less a great many of the competent employes will quit and accept positions with the Pennsylvania. Several have already resigned at Sayre and many others have intimated that they intend to do likewise.

This condition has caused no little alarm, for the cold weather is now approaching, and in order to keep the motive power in continual operation it is always necessary to employ an increased force during this season of year. The officials claim that they cannot get the necessary number of men and that therefore it will be necessary to meet the advance offered by the Pennsylvania.

According to unofficial information the directors of the Lehigh Valley, the Lackawanna and the Jersey Central will hold a meeting shortly and an effort will be made to rearrange a wage schedule for the mechanics. It will not surprise those in a position to know if the announcement of an advance was made this month.
