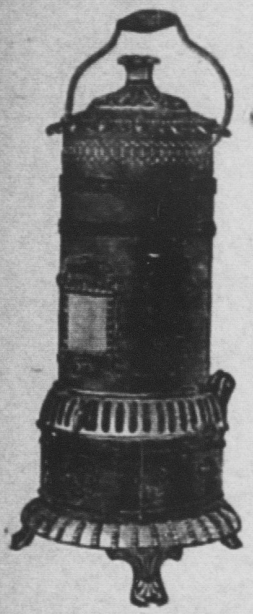

**LIBRARY CLUB EXTENSION DAY**

Excellent Program Rendered and the Various Reports Were Gratifying

The Ladies Library Club met at the usual time yesterday. It was Library Extension Day and after transaction of the regular business the Library committee, represented by Mrs. Vine Crandall, took charge of the program. Mrs. Thurston gave a very gratifying report of the Athens Library. This report will be given to the public later. Miss Peckens sang two beautiful selections, (a) "Quando a te lieta" Gounod, (b) "Without Thee" Guy d'Hardelot. In the "Echoes from the Biennial Federation," Mrs. Murray expressed the view of Mrs. Decker, Pres. of the General Federation, concerning Centralization also gave a clear explanation of Library Extension. Mrs. Bishop entertained the ladies with an interesting account of her visit to a vacation school in Pittsburg. These schools are for the purpose of helping the poor children of the crowded tenement districts. In these schools the library extension committee have been able to place many of their books. Mrs. Driggs of Sayre followed this talk with one of her charming solos, "The Zephyr." After intermission Rev. A. F. von Tobel read an interesting paper on "Library Extension" using for its foundation the words: "Of making many books there is no end; and much study is a weariness of the flesh." He made graphic comparison of the days of Solomon, with their few hundred manuscripts and the present time with its millions of volumes, showing the growth of education with the increase of books; the multiplication of public libraries and their influence upon the nation. The club tendered Mr. von Tobel a rising vote of thanks for his very able paper. Mrs. Cary read "The Lottery of the Public Library," after which Miss Bonney pleased her hearers with the piano solo, "Mazurka de Concert" as well as a second selection. The club accepted Captain Albertson's invitation to inspect his library, and examine this fine collection of books on Thursday afternoon. In connection with library extension day a number of books were presented to the Spaulding library, and as a fitting close for the day the club gave a permanent pledge of fifty dollars annually to the same institution. The club has also furnished for use in the coming art exhibit for the benefit of the public schools, the General Federation's art program, and the art catalogue of the Kansas Federation of Women's Clubs.
