



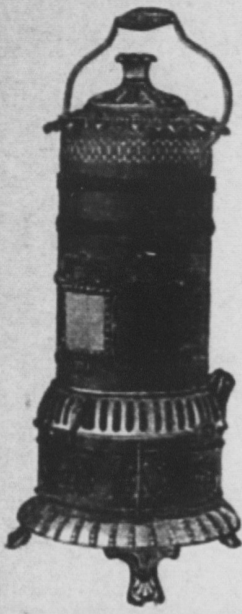

### MISCREANT CUT TROLLEY WIRE

Dispicable Deed Committed Last Night at Coddington's Corners.

Just as one of the late south-bound trolley cars rounded the turn at Coddington's Corners last night it suddenly came to a stop. It was at first thought that the trolley had jumped the wire, but an investigation on the part of the conductor developed the fact that the trolley wire had been severed. Just after he made the discovery the conductor saw a man leap from the top of the car to the ground and run hurriedly away into the darkness. Who the man was is not known, but an examination of the wire showed that it had been cut in two with a sharp instrument. Traffic was delayed considerable until the wire could be spliced. Just what satisfaction any one could find in committing a depredation of this character is difficult to understand. The police have been notified.

### CHARGES NON-SUPPORT

John C. McCracken was arrested last night on complaint of his wife, Jessie McCracken, who alleges that her husband is failing to properly provide her with support. McCracken is paying his wife by order of the court twelve dollars per week for the support of his two minor children, but at the time this order was made he was suing his wife for divorce. The divorce proceeding was dropped and his wife alleges that he made an agreement to live with her and continue to provide for her. This she says he has failed to do and therefore has caused his arrest. He will be given a hearing before Justice Carey on Monday morning.

### WAGES NOT RAISED

Much to the disappointment of its thousand employees the directors of the Lehigh Valley, at their meeting failed to follow the example of the Pennsylvania, Reading and other lines in ordering a general advance of wages. The question, it is said, was not even discussed.

The members of the Black Diamond train crew who were fined five dollars each for running the pride of the Lehigh through the city of Wilkes-Barre faster than the speed limit, have taken an appeal and the case will be fought out in the courts.

### WILL BE REBUILT

The Sullivan monument which stands on a high hill just north of Lowmantown, N. Y., in Chemung county, and which is fast crumbling to the ground, is to be rebuilt. The monument was erected nearly twenty-five years ago, and its unveiling was attended by one of the biggest crowds that ever assembled in Southern New York. The new monument will be removed from its present site to a point nearer the river road.

### WANTS DAMAGES

Mrs. Olive B. Smith of White Haven, widow of the late John Smith, has commenced an action in trespass against the Lehigh Valley Railroad company, asking \$15,000 for the death of her husband, who was killed on March 23, 1906, on the Bear Creek branch. Mrs. Smith claims that her husband's death was caused by the negligence of the railroad company.

### SEVERELY INJURED

A mechanic, whose name could not be learned, was severely injured at the shops late this afternoon. His left forearm was caught in a machine, and badly torn and lacerated. The ambulance was called and he was taken to the hospital.

### MORE COAL CASES

Herbert Bellis was before Justice Carey yesterday afternoon on a charge of taking coal from the Lehigh Valley tracks. Bellis was arrested by Constable Brougham on a warrant sworn out by T. B. Shaffer. The Lehigh is making a persistent effort to break up the practice of taking coal from the tracks and will arrest all offenders. Bellis settled with the company and the case was withdrawn.

Mrs. Steve Solok, a Hungarian woman, was also arraigned on a similar charge. She stoutly protested her innocence and her case was continued until nine o'clock this morning when she was given a hearing.

### NORTHRUP DISCHARGED

Ben, Northrup, who was arrested yesterday forenoon on suspicion of having thrown a stone through Bolton Bros.' store window, was arraigned last night before Justice Nelson and after a hearing was discharged, there being no evidence on which to hold him to court. Northrup, it is said was on the streets the night on which the window was broken, and the one dollar bills taken. It is also said that he had mud on his shoes, and this gave rise to the belief that he might have done the job. The men who claimed to see the individual who did it, however, were unable to identify Northrup as the man. Therefore he was released.

Defendant Says That His Wife and Her Mother Entertained Italians at His Home.

The case of the Commonwealth versus Lewis Skinner was heard before Judge Fanning at Towanda yesterday. The complainant, Carrie Skinner, is the defendant's wife and she alleges that her husband has failed to provide her with support. A number of witnesses were sworn on both sides. Skinner in his testimony swore that his wife and mother were in the habit of entertaining Italians at his home, and that when he learned of this he did not feel like providing for his wife. Judge Fanning reserved his decision.
