A Gigantic Traction Merger. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 27.—Plans for the organization of a gigantic holding company to include the eight interurban traction lines known as the Indiana Union Traction, Indianapolis and Western, Indianapolis and Northwestern, Indianapolis and Eastern, Indianapolis and Martinsville, Indianapolis Coal Traction, Wayne and Wabash Valley and the Richmond Street and Interurban are about to be perfected. The merger will make the largest of the second largest traction system in the world.

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

Fine Addresses Marked the Close of the Semi-Centennial Week

The Alumni Association of the Waverly high school are to be congratulated upon the men they secured for last evening. The crowd which packed Loomis Opera House showed that the village appreciated the efforts which had been made and the three excellent addresses which were delivered made a fitting close to the semi-centennial week.

The entire celebration from beginning to end has been a glorious success in every respect and will certainly do more toward uniting the efforts of the teachers and parents than anything which has occurred in the entire history of the school.

Dr. Goodwin assistant commissioner of the state board of education made the first address. He showed by statistics the vastly different methods of education now from those which sufficed fifty years ago. He showed that the influx of immigrants into the cities made this necessary because not only the native born children were to be educated to make good citizens but also the foreign born. Fifty years ago a large percentage lived in the rural districts but now two-thirds of the population resided in the cities.

Dr. Henry Leipzig head of the free lecture bureau of New York city was the next speaker. He had acquainted himself thoroughly with the history of the Waverly schools and complimented those who in years past had worked to make the schools what they are. He showed how much greater effort would have to be made in the future by parents and teachers in order that the growth of the schools should keep pace with the growth of the town.

He argued for better equipments, better buildings and the best teachers obtainable. He said all these tend to make better citizens and make the town a safer and happier place in which to dwell. In introducing Dr. Raymond, president of the Union College, Supt. Robbins said he was going to vary the usual order of introduction and he then introduced the Lyric Glee club who sang Union's most popular song.

Dr. Raymond opened his remarks by saying that the song made him feel very much at home because he heard it all day and most of the night. He said first he was going to tell how he came to be asked to make an address here. He said, the first principal of the Waverly schools, Prof. Lang, was a graduate of Union and one of the first lawyers in town was a graduate of Union. Then the present principal, Mr. Meserve, was also a Union graduate, and that explained why he was invited to come to Waverly. In a bright manner he stated that men ought to be educated not only to fit them for special positions but because they were men and in order to make men of them. He thought a liberal education broadened a man's scope of vision so that he could enjoy all he read and heard to a given extent.
