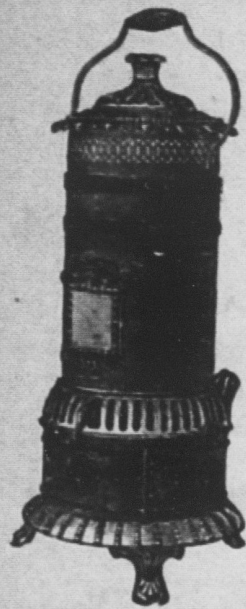

ORENISH CHARGES HIGHWAY ROBBERY

Says That Benny] Watts and Another Man Touched Him For \$35—Watts Under Arrest

Benjamin Watts, familiarly known as "Benny," and Michael Lynch were arrested here today on a charge of robbery from the person. The complainant in the case is Tony Orenish, a Hungarian, who says that one man grabbed him while Watts went through his pockets and extracted therefrom a twenty-dollar bill and two fives, \$35.00 in all. Lynch was with Watts during the forenoon and had about \$45.00 in bills, a part of which the Hungarian identified as his money. He said, however, that Lynch was not with Watts when the alleged robbery took place, but the latter was placed under arrest for the reason it was believed that the money had been passed to him by Watts.

The robbery occurred on River street, according to the Hungarian. He says that he was walking along the street about 11 o'clock, when he was approached by Watts and another man, who has not been seen since. The latter grabbed the Hungarian and Watts, it is alleged, went through the Hungarian's pockets. He notified Chief Walsh and the latter was not long in finding Watts. The latter was intoxicated, and when arraigned before Justice Carey on a warrant charging robbery from the person, he became so boisterous that it was necessary to commit him to the lockup until he gets sober. He will be given a hearing tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

When Lynch was searched he declared that he had been working for a farmer near Auburn since April last, and that on the 21st of the present month the farmer settled with him paying him fifty dollars. In support of this contention he exhibited a small account book showing his account with Murphy. There was an entry to the effect that he had been given fifty dollars by Murphy on November 21. Chief Walsh took possession of the money, however, and will place it in the National Bank of Sayre, pending a further investigation. Both men were considerably intoxicated and had been drinking together all the forenoon. Both pleaded innocence declaring that they knew nothing of the entire affair.

HELD TO COURT BUT BROKE JAIL

Heemans Admitted Guilt and Then Took French Leave

Lyman Heeman, Sr., and Lyman Heeman Jr., were arraigned before Justice Carey yesterday afternoon on charges of stealing brass and copper from the Lehigh Valley railroad company on November 3. Both pleaded not guilty and demanded hearings. At the conclusion of the taking of testimony both father and son were held for further hearings. Recently the elder Heeman had the misfortune to break one of the bones in his shoulder and he was carrying his arm in a sling. He was permitted to go on his own recognizance. His son was committed to the lockup until this morning when he was to have been taken to the county jail at Towanda. When Chief Walsh visited the jail last night, however, he discovered that Heeman had taken French leave, going up through to the roof and thence to the ground where the rest was easy. Heeman is a bad egg. His two brothers were sent to Auburn prison yesterday and he bids fair to follow them sooner or later. He is reported to have gone to his home at Waverly, but when the officers arrived there he had flown.

HEEMAN WENT UP THROUGH THE ROOF

Broke Jail Last Night While the Borough Daddys Were Talking Repairs

Last night while the borough daddys were discussing plans for repairing the borough lockup, Lyman Heeman, Jr., who yesterday afternoon had pleaded guilty to larceny of iron and copper from the Lehigh Valley, was busy digging his way out of the shack which has served the purpose of a jail since the beginning of Sayre as a municipality. Heeman was to have been taken to Towanda on the early morning train by Constable Spencer Brougham and that official had the necessary commitment papers in his inside pocket. But—"the best laid plans of mice and men often gang a'lee." Last night when Chief Walsh visited the lockup he discovered that the cell which had been occupied by young Heeman was empty. He investigated and a hole in the roof of the shack disclosed the reason for Heeman's absence. He had made his way up the air shaft to the attic between the upper ceiling and the roof. HEEMANS SENT TO AUBURN PRISON

They Burglarized Lockwood Brothers' Store at Lockwood.

Fred and Henry Hemans pleaded guilty in county court at Owego yesterday to burglarizing Lockwood Brother's store at Lockwood several weeks ago. Henry was sentenced to a term of five years in the state prison at Auburn, while Fred was let off with a term of not less than one year and three months nor more than three years. The Heeman brothers were formerly of Towanda and are a bad bunch. They have spent most of their time in jail recently and the officers in this section will breathe a sigh of relief when they learn that both have been put away for substantial terms. Yesterday Lyman Heeman, Sr. and Lyman Heeman, Jr., were arrested in Sayre for stealing iron and copper from the Lehigh. They belong to the same family and are usually in jail or out on bail upon one charge or another.

BOROUGH COUNCIL MET LAST NIGHT

Discussed Sewer Project, Lockup and Other Matters of Public Importance.

The borough council held a meeting last night to discuss the sewer project, consider plans for repairing the "bug house" and disposing of other matters pertaining to the conduct of the borough's affairs.

The sewer project provoked considerable discussion which resulted in a resolution being passed providing for the reprinting of the plans and specifications which have been changed in a few of the minor details. The borough attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance in accordance with the plans and specifications as changed, and have it ready for the December meeting of the council.

The question of repairing the borough lockup also came up and was the subject of considerable talk. Recently the building has been repainted and certain repairs have been made, but it is admitted by the police department that it is not a safe place in which to confine prisoners. While the councilmen discussed the lockup a prisoner held to appear at court was then working his way out of the building to liberty. Council Evans suggested that the building should be provided with a barbed wire roof. Other members of the council were of the opinion that if the interior were papered it would be all right, while others suggested that the recent coat of paint should afford ample protection against the escape of prisoners. The matter was finally left to the police committee.

Mrs. Rudolph Fleischutt presented a bill for \$125 for damages done to her home on the night of the riot in Sayre last Summer. Mrs. Fleischutt's building, which is situated on East Lockhart street, was occupied by several Italians and was therefore particularly obnoxious to the rioters. They pelted it with stones and damaged it to a considerable extent. Now she wants the borough to settle the damages. The bill was referred to the borough attorney and he will report at the next meeting of the council.

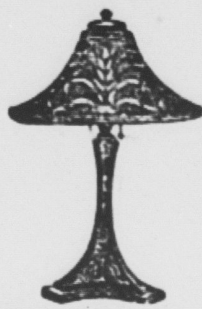

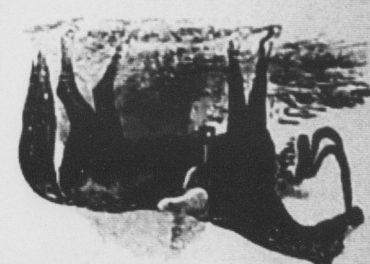
