FOUND THE WATER PURE AT PEMBLETON'S POND

Waverly—Some time ago a sample of the water from Pembleton's pond was sent to E. M. Pierce, director of the New York state department of health for the purpose of ascertaining its fitness for ice. The report states that the two tests showed 500 and 750 organisms per cubic centimeter, and there was no colon bacillus found in the sample received, and it was free from any organic pollution. The test showed that the water was of a high degree of purity. Mr. Pierce adds the following to his report: "It being known that freezing has a tendency to further purify water, the consumers of Pembleton's pond ice can feel assured that it is perfect so far as health is concerned."

BOARD OF TRUSTEES TRANSACT BUSINESS.

Assess Sprinkling Tax—Consider Petition for New Street, Order Crossed Planked.

Waverly—After a long wait last night a sufficient number of the village trustees appeared to constitute a quorum, and the board proceeded to discuss several matters of importance.

A petition was presented signed from a number of citizens, asking that a street be opened from Broad street through to Ithaca street. The street. The board took the matter under the premises now occupied by P. J. Sheahan, and will run north in almost a direct line to Ithaca street. The board took the matter under consideration, and will hold a meeting on December 29 for the purpose of hearing evidence in regard to the street, and listening to any objections that may be raised against putting it through.

The assessment for the gutter and curb that was recently put in on Fulton street was taken up, and the assessment made against the property owners. The bill for sprinkling the streets during the past year amounted to the sum of \$869.50, and last night that sum was assessed against the property owners in front of whose places the streets were sprinkled. The assessment was made on the basis of assessed valuation, and amounts to 95 cents on each thousand dollars. This sum is considered as being remarkably low for the benefits conferred by the sprinkling. The board also passed a resolution that the Erie railroad Co. be notified to plank the Fulton street crossing within 10 days. The usual number of current bills were ordered paid.

INITIATED THE FENDER ON THE FIRST TRIP

Waverly—The fenders were placed on the South Waverly car for the first time this morning and it was only a short time before one of them was smashed. A number of grade stakes had been placed in the ground between the rails, and the fender was so low that it struck them.
