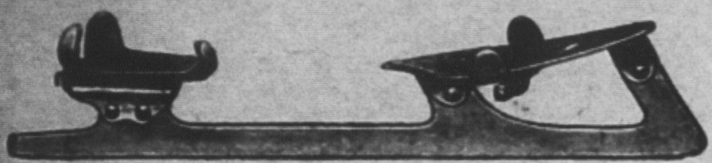

### UNRULY FOREIGNER LODGED IN JAIL

Tony Malisa, an Italian, Arrested This Morning Charged with Aggravated Assault—Resisted Arrest and is Knocked Down by an Officer.

Tony Malisa, an Italian about 24 years old, was arrested here this forenoon and lodged in jail charged with aggravated assault. The complainant in the case is Pietro Pietromergeno (the pronouncing of which last name by an experienced tongue sounds like the noise made by a seltzer bottle which has been quickly uncorked) and he alleges that Malisa struck him last night with a stiletto. Malisa is known among his fellow countrymen as a "bum." Recently he has been working for the Lehigh Valley but the other day was discharged. Since that time he has devoted the most of his time to consuming firewater in large quantities. Last night Malisa went to his boarding house conducted by Mike and John Canninivo at No. 130 East street. He was filled to the muzzle with bad booze and it is alleged that he made life extremely miserable for the inmates of the house. About ten o'clock he went to his room and found his bed occupied by the man with the unpronounceable name. The latter alleged that Malisa became enraged and drew a stiletto and struck him with the weapon several times. Fortunately he inflicted no serious injury but Malisa's actions then became such that the inmates of the house feared personal violence and they sent for the police. Special Officer John Hummel and Officer Julius Vogel responded and when they entered the house Malisa was executing a war-dance and threatening to decrease the population of Sayre by at least two or three. He had his hands in his pockets and his entire attitude boded no good for the officers. He refused to remove his hands from his pockets until the officers had persuaded him with a gun. Then he became abusive and resisted arrest so strongly that one of the officers was compelled to knock him down. He was taken to the lockup where he spent the night on a charge of disorderly conduct. This morning a warrant was issued by Justice Carey charging aggravated assault and carrying concealed weapons.

### DOMINIC SHARRONE FACES TRIAL JURY.

Alleged Murderer of Eugene Messenger Arraigned Yesterday Before Judge Fanning. Dominic Sharrone, the Italian, charged with the murder of Eugene Messenger at Athens on August 23, was placed on trial in the court of quarter sessions at Towanda yesterday. He is represented by Hon. L. T. Hoyt, while District Attorney Mills has charge of the case for the commonwealth. A jury was secured late yesterday afternoon and today has been occupied in hearing the witnesses for the commonwealth. It is thought that the case will go to the jury the first of the week.

### FUNERAL TO BE HELD TOMORROW MORNING.

Remains of John Strauss Will Be Laid to Rest in Tioga Point Cemetery. The funeral of John Strauss, whose death occurred on Wednesday last at the Presbyterian hospital in Philadelphia, will be held at the family residence on North Elmer avenue tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, the Rev. E. M. Beyer, pastor of the Lutheran church, officiating. The remains arrived in Sayre this morning at 3 o'clock. The Masons will have charge of the services at the grave. The remains will be interred in Tioga Point cemetery.

### SIX KILLED IN BIG FIRE AT ITHACA

Disastrous Conflagration in Progress in Chi Psi Fraternity House at Cornell University—Six Fatally Injured, Several Seriously Hurt.

The Chi Psi fraternity house at Cornell University—the Fiske (Jennie McGraw) mansion, which cost \$1,200,000, caught fire just before noon today, and telegraph despatches received this afternoon say that the inside of the building is burning fiercely. Three students and three firemen were killed and several others severely injured as a result of the collapse of the hospital tower. Two students are reported missing. The young son of M. B. Cutler, general manager of the Lehigh Valley, and his young friend, both of whom roomed together, are reported safe. Both young men are well known here. Mr. Cox having formerly worked under Mr. Cunningham in the maintenance of way department. The conflagration promises to be an expensive one. The origin of the fire is unknown and the firemen are making the fight of their lives to prevent its spread.

### DELANEY SENDS OUT CHRISTMAS WARNING.

Factory Law Must Be Observed During the Holiday Season.

Chief Factory Inspector J. C. Delaney has sent the following notice to the deputy factory inspectors in this region: "I direct that from now on until Christmas you exercise special vigilance against the violation of the law regulating the hours of labor of females and minors. It will be well for you to warn employers of such labor in your respective districts that the law must be respected, and that prosecutions will follow violations." The law provides that "no child under 14 years of age shall be employed in any establishment; and no minor child under 16 years and no female shall be employed in any establishment for a longer period than 60 hours in any one week, nor for a longer period than 12 hours in any day."

### ACTIVITY OF TRADE BLOCKS RAILROADS.

Railway Officials Fear a Congestion in Traffic During Holiday Season. The unprecedented activity of trade continues in all parts of the country but this activity is the cause of apprehension on the part of the railroad men. A serious fear of congestion in railway traffic is apprehended as the trade facilities of transportation, affecting grain movements, the transportation of coal and merchandise from the east, and hampers manufacturing operations in the iron and steel, lumber and textile industries. Such a record breaking activity appears to have its drawbacks. The Lehigh Valley at the present time is rushed to the limit. Crews are working overtime and every car on the line has been pressed into service. The rush, however, will subside at the close of the holiday season.

### ELY'S TRIAL HAS BEEN CONTINUED.

Man Who Robbed Lehigh Station at Ithaca Will Face Jury January 28th. In the supreme court at Ithaca yesterday the case of Clarence Ely, charged with robbing the Lehigh Valley station at that place last fall, was continued until the 28th day of January next. Ely is the man who entered the station while the agent slept and extracted nearly 1,200 from the money drawer. After an exciting chase he was rounded up in a hotel at Watkins, confessed to having taken the money, and gave the officers assistance in finding it. He was in jail for a time, but was later, released on bail.

### EAST ITHACA STATION ENTERED BY THIEVES.

Three Trunks Broken Open and the Contents Distributed About the Waiting Room. Sometime between twelve o'clock midnight and six o'clock yesterday morning unknown thieves entered the Lehigh Valley station at East Ithaca, smashed both telephones pay station boxes, securing the cash therefrom and broke into and rifled three trunks. Detectives in the employ of the company are at work on the case. It is thought that two tramps are implicated in the burglary but it is doubtful if they are caught.
